TO MEET THE NEEDS OF OFF-CAMPUS STUDENTS, the University again will offer a three-credit hour course in music appreciation over KRXL radio. THE NATIONAL WILDLIFE FEDERATION is distributing application forms for its 1977-78 Environmental Conservation Fellowship program. Awards up to \$4,000 will be made to advance the cause of natural resource management, encourage research likely to produce data beneficial to National Wildlife Federation education programs, and contribute to the enhancement of the environment. The program is aimed primarily at assisting candidates for graduate degrees, but post-doctoral research also will be considered. Applications must be submitted by Dec. 31, 1976 and are available from the national headquarters of the National Wildlife Federation, 1412 16th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.
