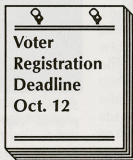


In an effort to make sure every student, faculty and staff member at Northeast is currently registered to vote, Student Senate and faculty and staff volunteers are conducting a massive voter registration drive.

"Our goal is to have everyone who has an interest in Northeast registered to vote by the Oct. 12 deadline," said Randy Hagerty, assistant professor of political science.

In addition to the campuswide effort, a representative from the Adair County Clerk's Office will be on campus from 9 a.m.-3 p.m., Sept. 20 through 23, SUB main floor, to register voters for the upcoming Nov. 8 election.



GUIDELINES FOR VOTER REGISTRATION

- 1. YOU MUST RE-REGISTER TO VOTE IF YOU HAVE MOVED SINCE THE LAST ELECTION.** Foreexample, if you have moved across the hall in the same residence hall, your old registration is no longer valid.
- 2. YOU SHOULD REGISTER TO VOTE IN THIS DISTRICT.** Under the new election law, first time voters must vote in person. Also, Student Senate will help you change your registration back to you home district after the election if you so desire.
- 3. OUT-OF-STATE STUDENTS CAN REGISTER TO VOTE HERE IN MISSOURI.** Out-of-state students can register to vote in Missouri as long as they meet the Oct. 12 registration deadline.
- 4. SEVENTEEN-YEAR-OLDS MAY REGISTER AND VOTE AS LONG AS THEY TURN 18 BY OR ON ELECTION DAY (NOV. 8).**
- 5. YOU MUST BE A UNITED STATES CITIZEN TO REGISTER AND VOTE.**

Northeast Collaborates With Area School Districts

The Division of Education has been awarded a \$150,000 grant from the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to establish a regional professional development center for teachers.

"If the teacher learns something new, it will affect the student," said Patricia Miller, head of the Division of Education. "That's the whole purpose of it."

The program will reach 2,579 teachers, and through those teachers, 35,213 area students. The center, to be located on campus, will offer professional development opportunities for school administrators, teachers and other school employees to enhance instruction. The center will provide consultants and offer workshops and con-

ferences to teachers from the participating schools. "Having these programs and conferences will provide a network among area teachers," Miller said. "They can collaborate to address some of the needs of this region."

Establishing communication networks is one of the objectives of the program. Other objectives include encouraging and supporting curriculum development and cooperative learning, exploring strategies to improve student achievement, providing training programs for school staff, and establishing a lending library for regional schools.

Northeast's education students will have the opportunity to participate in the center's activities and learn along side profession-

The grant will phase out over three years. With a portion of the staff development funds from the participating districts, Miller expects the program to be self-supported by that time. ☛

Lyceum Features Hal Galper Quartet

The Lyceum Series will present the Hal Galper Quartet in concert at 7:30 p.m., Sept. 26 in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff are available in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

Galper, a Grammy winning pianist, has more than 65 recordings to his credit, including 14 as a leader in his own right. Galper "discovered" his love for music while spending time at local Boston clubs hearing music played by musicians such as Jackie Byard and Alan Dawson. Soon Galper became the house piano player at Boston clubs such as The Stables, Connelly's and Lenny's On The Turnpike.

After taking a few years off, Galper heard Chet Baker was in town looking for a piano player. Galper sat in on a jazz



workshop with Baker and was hired on the spot. The two musicians parted when Galper wanted to play more modern music.

After some time playing alone, Galper returned to New York and was reunited with Phil Woods, a musician he had met in Boston. While playing with Woods and other musicians, Galper recorded two mainstream albums under his own name.

Galper spent the next few years touring with groups and alone until he was reunited once again with Woods. Galper joined The Phil Woods Quartet in 1979 and spent the next ten years performing with the group.

Galper left the Quartet in August 1990 to begin touring with his new trio that he calls, "A choice rhythm section that plays with a big beat and is sophisticated enough to go in any musical direction."
