Northeast Ranked One of America's Best Colleges

NMSU is the only public Missouri institution to earn a spot in the 1990 *U.S. News & World Report* rankings of "America's Best Colleges."

Northeast was ranked 13th among Midwest colleges and universities—the "vast middle ground filled with 562 public and private institutions that occupy a vital and expanding place in the complex structure of American higher

education." William Jewell College, a private school located in Liberty, Mo., ranked fourth in the same category. Northeast and Michigan Technological University were the only public institutions among the Midwest's top 15 schools.

U.S. News & World Report based its survey on five academic areas: selectivity, reputation, quality of faculty, financial resources and student retention.

Selectivity was based on admission acceptance rates, college-entrance examination scores and high-school class standings among members of the freshman class.

Reputation was determined by the results of a survey administered to nearly 3,900 college presidents, academic deans and admissions officers. This is the fifth year *U.S. News* has administered the survey.

Faculty quality figures were based on student/faculty ratios, percentage of faculty with doctorates and faculty salaries.

Financial resources rankings were derived from colleges' per-student endow-

ment income, library budget and funding from state and local governments.

Retention was measured by the average percentage of freshmen in the '85-'87 classes who returned to that institution as sophomores and the average percentage of freshmen in the classes of '81, '82 and '83 who earned bachelor's degrees from that institution within five years.

U.S. News ranked Northeast as the number one "best buy" among the Midwest's top colleges and universities based on tuition.

Northeast was also listed in the 1988 *U.S. News* survey as one of the country's five most innovative colleges and universities. It was the only public institution among the five.

Among other small public ivy colleges cited in the *U.S. News & World Report* were Evergreen State College, ranked second among regional liberal-arts colleges in the West, and the University of North Carolina-Asheville, listed as one of the up-and-coming regional colleges and universities in the South.

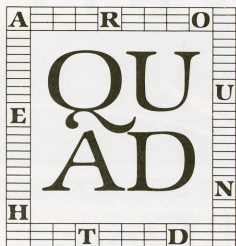

Northeast's Lyceum Series Presents Navy Jazz Ensemble

The Lyceum Series will present the United States Navy's premier jazz ensemble, the Commodores, in concert at 8 p.m., Oct. 31, in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff are available in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

The Commodores, a specialty unit of the United States Navy Band based in Washington, D.C., offer the finest in America's true classical music—jazz—with a mixture of styles ranging from the authentic sounds of the swing era to contemporary high-energy music.

Directed by Senior Chief Musician Gerard Ascione, the group features 18 of the Navy's top jazz and "big band" musicians.

The Commodores date back to 1966 when the group was known as the United States Navy Dance Band. The band was comprised of volunteers from the Concert Band who performed at military ceremonies during the day and for dance engagements in the evening.

As the demand for the dance band increased, the ensemble's ceremonial duties were curtailed, and in January 1969, the "Commodores" became the official Navy Band jazz ensemble.

Since then, the group has added vocalists, toured throughout the United States and abroad and featured leading jazz artists including Dizzy Gillespie, Grover Washington Jr., Hank Levy and Pete Christlieb.

The group presents frequent concert series in the Washington, D.C., area, plus numerous summertime performances at parks and amphitheaters. The Commodores are also featured in "Navy '89," a weekly summer ceremony presented at the Washington Navy Yard. In addition, it is the only military band to appear at the famed Newport Jazz Festival.

They have presented concerts, clinics and recitals as part of the Navy Band's annual International Saxophone Symposium since its inception in 1978, and were featured in two Eastern Trombone workshops hosted by the band. The group has performed at several national music educators' gatherings including the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Convention, Mid-East Instrumental Music Conference and National Association of Jazz Educators Convention.

In July 1986, the ensemble performed in New York harbor for the Liberty Weekend festivities. In addition to serving as the opening act for a Beach Boys concert aboard the battleship USS Iowa, the Commodores performed for dignitaries on Ellis Island the evening of the Statue of Liberty rededication. At the 1987, 1988 and 1989 July 4 celebrations on the Washington Monument grounds, the Commodores performed for crowds of approximately 150,000.

Stephen Allen, assistant professor of business administration, has an article titled "A Decision Impact Model" published in the September issue of *Engineering Management Journal*.

Wilson Named Nan Wade Professor



Professor of English Herman Wilson has been appointed the Nan Wade Distinguished Professor of English for the 1989-90 academic year.

The Board of Governors established the

distinguished chair to honor Nan Wade, professor emeritus of modern languages, and to promote excellence in scholarship.

Wade, who taught at Northeast from 1938-56, is remembered by many as an outstanding teacher. Throughout her 27 years of teaching French, Spanish and English, and still today, her students have expressed the strong impressions that Wade made upon them. Wade died in 1981.

Wilson, who was surprised by the appointment, said being named the Nan Wade Distinguished Professor would require him to work harder to be the best professor he knows how to be.

"I've just been overwhelmed by the whole bit," he said.

Although Wilson never met Wade, he said that over the years, his colleagues have told him that the way he works and teaches resembles the ways of Nan Wade. Both the comparison to Wade and the appointment have made Wilson feel honored.

Wilson has taught at the University since 1968. He earned his bachelor's from Carson-Newman College and his master's and doctorate from the University of Tennessee.

His professional affiliations include the National Council of Teachers of English, the Midwest Modern Language Association and the Modern Language Association of America.
