## Appleberry To Deliver Commencement Address



Northeast's 123rd spring commencement will begin at 2 p.m., May 8, in Stokes Stadium. More than 800 candidates will graduate during the ceremony. In the event of inclement weather, commencement exercises will be held in Pershing Arena.

James B. Appleberry, president of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), will deliver the address. AASCU is a Washington-based higher education association representing more than 375 public institutions and 30 state systems nationwide.

A native of Waverly, Mo., Appleberry began his career as a teacher and principal in a rural Missouri school district. He said his decision to work at the national level is based on

AASCU's dedication to ensuring a national commitment to affordable higher education in the United States.

"Any deprivation of the opportunities to learn, including the deprivation of the access to higher education leads to intellectual bondage," Appleberry said.

Appleberry became the second president of AASCU in 1991, after serving as president of Northern Michigan University for eight years. Prior to his presidency at NMU, he served for nearly seven years as president of Pittsburg State University in Kansas.

Appleberry holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Central Missouri State University and was its first graduate fellow, receiving his education specialist degree in 1967. He joined the faculty of Oklahoma State University following completion of his doctorate at OSU in 1968.

Appleberry served as assistant, associate and full professor as well as chair of his academic

department at Oklahoma State, and in 1973 was chosen by the American Council on Education as a fellow in its Academic Administration Internship Program.

In 1975, he joined the University of Kansas as director of planning and a professor of administration, foundations and higher education. Nine months later, he was named assistant to the chancellor, a post he held until being named president at Pittsburg State University.

Appleberry has served on numerous national committees. He was appointed vice chair of the National Center for Education Statistics Advisory Council by the U.S. Secretary of Education, and most recently served as a member of the NCAA Presidents Commission.

Appleberry's commitment to education is based in his belief that the nation's economic future, national security and the education of its people are inextricably linked.

"Every person in our country who grows up in ignorance because of inadequate education ultimately contributes to the decline of this nation," he said. "The undeveloped intelligence and ability of even one person in our nation is a tragedy, as well as a tragic denial of the person's ability to control his or her own destiny."

"Unfulfilled potential will result in unemployment, unenlightened citizen participation in our governmental processes, reduced productivity and personal stagnation," he said.

**Judy Allen**, senior mathematics major, presented her paper "Exploring Braess' Paradox" at the national Kappa Mu Epsilon convention. Allen, nine other students and two faculty members attended the convention held at Niagara University in Niagara Falls, N.Y., on April 23-24.

**Mark Appold**, associate professor of philosophy and religion, presented a paper at the American Academy of Religion and the Society of Biblical Literature regional meeting in Omaha, Neb., on April 17. The paper, titled "Bethsaida: Geographical Traditions in the Johannine Community" was given in the NT Archeology section of the SBL and will be published in the Bethsaida Excavations Project collection of essays.

**Keith Doubt**, assistant professor of sociology, recently had his review of *Postmodernism and Social Theory* edited by Steven Seidman and David Wagner, and *Intimations of Postmodernity* by Zygmunt Bauman appear in the March issue of *Contemporary Sociology*.

**Taj Hargey**, assistant professor of African history, enrolled Northeast as a new and formal member of the Association of African Studies Program organization. At its annual conference, attended by 60 leading universities and colleges nationwide, Northeast has now become the only institution from Missouri which is represented in the discipline's foremost academic association. Northeast's organizational membership has already put it on the federal register for grants and will confer additional prestige by giving it further recognition among the major universities engaging in research on African Studies.

**John Ishiyama**, assistant professor of political science, presented a paper titled "Political Dimensions of AIDS Containment Strategies: A Comparative Analysis" at the annual meeting of the Midwest Political Science Association meeting in Chicago on April 16.

**Jim Jereb**, assistant professor of art, has been invited to conduct a workshop on plate lithography at Wenatchee Valley College, Wyo. He has recently received an award of merit at the exhibition "Art from Academia: Into the Nineties" held in Kansas City, Mo., and a purchase award from the Printmaking Council of New Jersey. Other works are currently showing at the 31st annual Print Exhibition at the San Diego Art Institute, and Jereb has been invited for a one-man show at the Bradford Brinton Memorial Museum, Big Horn, Wyo.

**Jerry Mayhew**, professor of exercise science, recently collaborated with researchers at the University of New Orleans to publish his study titled "Comparison of Physiologic and Performance Variables in Male and Female Cross-Country Runners During a Competitive

Season" in *Sports Medicine, Training, and Rehabilitation*.

**Keith Pavliscek**, assistant college professor of Missouri North Residential College, was selected as a 1993 Salvatori Fellow at the Salvatori Center for Academic Leadership, the Heritage Foundation, Washington, D.C. Pavliscek is one of 40 young faculty and doctoral candidates in the humanities and social sciences who will be brought to Washington, D.C., this summer to participate in a 10-day faculty colloquium on the theme "Foundations of American Liberty." The colloquium will examine the fundamental principles of American constitutionalism as articulated in the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and other documents of the founding era and will include meetings with congressional leaders and other policymakers to study the roles of ideas in public affairs and the character of political leadership in America. After completion of the colloquium, Salvatori Fellows continue their affiliation with the Heritage Foundation as adjunct scholars.

**Dwyane Smith**, assistant director of admissions, presented a workshop titled "Unconditional Belief: Promoting Academic Success Among African American Students" at the Annual Missouri Conference on Blacks in Higher Education in Jefferson City, Mo., on April 14-16.

**Laura Tamakoshi**, assistant professor of anthropology, organized and participated in three sessions at the recent Association for Social Anthropology in Oceania meetings held in Kona, Hawaii, on March 24-28. The titles of sessions and papers were: Strategies of Violence in the Contemporary Pacific; "The Politics of Rape in Papua New Guinea"; Women, Age and Power; "The Women at Kobum Spice Company"—Tensions in a Local Age Stratification System and the Undermining of Local Development"; and Women in Development in the Pacific; "Unacceptable Difference"—Gender Politics and Failed Development in Southern Madang Province, Papua New Guinea.

**Thom Kennedy**, senior studio art/photography major, has two works on exhibition at the National Juried Competition held in Somerville, N.J. Kennedy's photolithographs will be shown at three separate galleries through June.
