Applications are evaluated once a year and must be received, along with credentials and endorsements, by October 15. Robin Lukefahr, Freshmen Counseling; Ricki Trosen, Special Services; and Sandra Brown, Tami Morse, Carol Rampley, Mindy Tiemann, Merri Wohlschlaeger and Joye Wright attended the National Peer Counseling Association Conference April 6-7 at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill. They presented a program, "Let's Hear From the Students." The program highlighted the peer counseling program and its involvement with the career planning process at NMSU.

Kevin Smith was elected by his peers as the Echo year-book representative for Outstanding Student in Publications 1983-84. Smith served as editor in chief for the 1982-83 Index newspaper and the 1984 Echo. His name will appear on the plaque located in the student media office in Laughlin Building.

Shawn Cassidy and Rusty Smith participated in the American Forensic Association National Individual Events Tournament at Kansas State University in the dramatic duo category. The NMSU team was rated 18th out of 75 duo teams, and they advanced to the quarterfinal rounds. Their record was the second best of any team from District III, which includes Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri and Louisiana. Smith and Cassidy qualified for the event by winning first place in the dramatic duo category in three tournaments. Participants from 106 colleges and universities from across the United States competed in the event.
