Northeast's 125th: Eli F. Mittler



Eli F. Mittler

Following the resignation of President F. Clark Elkins in 1969, Eli F. Mittler was appointed as interim president, the first in the history of the school.

Born in Marthasville, Mo., in 1909, Mittler began his teaching career in the

rural schools of Warren County in 1927 following his graduation from high school. After receiving his Bachelor in Education from Central Missouri State Teachers College, Mittler earned his master's and doctoral

degrees from the University of Missouri-Columbia. He also did some post-graduate work at the University of Minnesota and Columbia University.

Mittler was named director of in-service education at Northeast Missouri State College in 1946. The following year he became head of the Division of Extension Services and director of the Bureau of Placements, a position he held from 1947-1965. As interim president from June 1969 until February 1970, Mittler announced an 'open-door' policy in regard to students visiting his office. Six months later, Charles McClain assumed the position and from that time until Mittler's retirement in July 1975, Mittler was vice president in charge of extra-divisional affairs. Mittler's honors include the 1969 citation by the NMSU Board of Regents and the coveted Distinguished Service Award of the Missouri Association of Adult Education, given to him in St. Louis in 1975.

Mittler died from a heart attack in his home in Warrenton, Mo., in 1983.

Housing Renewal A Success Some Spaces Available

According to Jason Haxton, director of Residential Living, this year's reapplication and renewal process for on-campus housing has been successful.

"Everyone basically has been able to get their hall and room choice, which was predicted because the Coeducational Implementation Committee had distributed a pre-renewal survey to find out what people were thinking."

Based on what the students said they wanted in the survey, Residential Living arranged the co-ed suites and co-ed wings. Haxton said overall, he felt his staff did a good job in setting up the female wings in Missouri Hall and working with the suite situation in Centennial.

The renewal and reapplication process gives current students the first opportunity at

residence hall spaces, then Residential Living looks at the spaces available and places the incoming freshmen. At any point in the process, Residential Living tries to provide the rooms and locations students want.

During renewal, more than 45 students off campus have returned to campus. Haxton said many of the returning students expressed that things worked out better for them in the hall system and they're glad to be back. Haxton cited the trend of attaining higher grade point averages, programming and accessibility to academic community as some of the advantages of on-campus housing. He said residents can expect to find a supportive staff, a caring community and a program dedicated to their needs. Others had trouble finding something off campus and have already reapplied.

We expect more people from off-campus to be applying for on-campus housing. For those wishing to apply for housing for the fall, call the Residential Living Office at 785-4227 or come by McClain Hall 204.

Haxton said the residence halls continue to be upgraded and options are better than they've ever been. Plans are under way longterm, to upgrade residence hall room furniture across campus. In addition, rooms may eventually have cable hook up and computer access, as mentioned in the Index. The Residential Living Office will work with students to provide their first choice as long as there are open spaces. At the point where on-campus needs are met, they open up the remaining process for incoming freshman.

Ryle Hall worker—10 positions at five hours per week and five positions at 10 hours per week. Duties include computer monitors, night monitors and desk workers.

Office worker—one position at five hours per week and two positions at 10 hours per week. Duties include computer work, mailings and deliveries.
