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Missouri London Program Under Way

The Missouri London Program (MLP) is accepting applications from students interested in overseas study during the fall 1990 semester. MLP is run by a consortium of the public universities of Missouri. The members of the consortium meet several times a year to discuss, plan and structure curricula, review applications and to appoint MLP faculty to teach in London.

NMSU students participating in the MLP will join other students from member institutions in Missouri: Central Missouri State, Northwest Missouri State, Southeast Missouri State, Southwest Missouri State, and the Universities of Missouri at Columbia, Rolla and St. Louis. Courses for the fall semester will be offered in economics, history, political science, philosophy, management and English.

The objective of the consortium members is to put together a schedule of courses, excursions and extracurricular activities that are interesting and informative. The package is designed to provide the student with a meaningful academic experience consistent with the greatest possible exposure to the advantages associated with study in the city of London and

surrounding areas.

The courses are taught in London by faculty from the Missouri universities that are members of the Missouri Consortium for International Studies. Students can earn from 12 to 15 academic credits that can be used to satisfy their degree requirements at their respective universities. This feature of the MLP enables the student to make normal progress toward his or her undergraduate degree while at the same time profiting from foreign resources and cross-cultural experiences.

The MLP makes it possible for students to get personal exposure to the culture of London, its museums, monuments and elegant shopping streets. The student's experience includes the great houses, West End Theatre performances, walking tour of little-known parts of the city, day excursions to Stonehenge, Salisbury and Stratford upon Avon; weekends in Edinburgh or pony trekking in Wales, as well as excursions to other places of interest and beauty throughout the British Isles and continental Europe.

MLP classes are held in two classrooms in Imperial College in the city of London. And all MLP students will have

membership in the Students Union of Imperial College. Their membership will allow them the use of the cafeteria, lounges, game rooms, Sport Hall and other facilities. There is also a good opportunity for Missouri students to form associations and friendships with British and other international students through formal and informal exchanges on campus. Imperial College is within walking distance of the student residences, which are located in the High Street Kensington area.

Any student in good standing at NMSU is eligible for admission to the MLP. The cost of the program is approximately \$2995 per student for 16 weeks. This cost does not include the student's regular tuition, registration fees at NMSU or round-trip airfare to London. Financial aid is available to eligible students.

"I strongly believe that this is a worthwhile learning experience that will serve students for the rest of their lives," associate professor of economics Seymour Patterson said.

Art Competition Winners Exhibition

The first place winners of the 1990 National Art Competition will have their artworks displayed in the University Art Gallery, first floor of Ophelia Parrish. The exhibition dates are Sept. 27 - Oct. 17 and features the sculptures of Jon Sontag and Baochi Zhang.

Sontag is presently a professor in the department of art and design at Iowa State University-Ames. He received his bachelor's degree and graduated with honors from Winona State College in 1955. He received his master's and doctorate from the University of Minnesota.

In 1990, Sontag received a first place

award in the National Art Competition in Kirksville, and an honorable mention in the 24th Annual National Drawing and Small Sculpture Show at Del Mar College in Corpus Christi, Texas. His sculpture works were accepted at Calgene Contemporary Fine Art Exhibition in Davis, Calif.

Zhang is an assistant professor at the University of California-Davis. He received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1982 from Xi'an College of Fine Arts, Xi'an, China. He received his master's degree in 1985 from The Academy of Arts of China, Beijing, China, and

another master's from Florida State University (Tallahassee). In 1989, Zhang received the university fellowship from Florida State University, and in 1990, he received a first place award from the National Art Competition in Kirksville. Zhang also had a solo-exhibition at Mont Dora Center for the Arts, Mont Dora, Fla.

A special slide presentation by Sontag will be held at 7:30 p.m., Oct. 4, in the SUB Activities Room. A reception will follow the presentation in the University Art Gallery. The fall 1990 gallery hours are 9:30 a.m. to 4:20 p.m., Mondays through Thursdays, and 9:30 a.m. to 3:20 p.m. on Fridays.

Scholarships Available

Applications for competitive and distinguished scholarships are now available for Northeast students of exceptional ability. For copies of the application forms and brochures as well as further information on the Truman, Rhodes, Mellon and Fulbright scholarships, please contact Dr. Peter Salztein, McClain Hall 211 C.

Harry S Truman Scholarship: Awarded to outstanding junior students who intend to pursue careers in public service. Each Truman scholarship covers tuition, fees, books and room and board up to a maximum of \$30,000 over a period of up to four years (i.e., one year of college and three years of graduate school). To be eligible, a junior must have at least a 3.0 GPA, be an American citizen and "have selected an undergraduate field of study that will permit admission to a graduate program leading to a career in public service." NMSU may nominate three candidates for the scholarship. Deadline for completion of all application materials is Dec. 1.

Rhodes Scholarship: Awarded to exceptional seniors who wish to pursue two to three years of study at Oxford University. The Rhodes Scholarship covers all tuition costs and provides a maintenance allowance of 5,322 pounds per year. To be eligible a senior must be under 24 years of age, be a citizen of the United States and complete his/her bachelor's degree before Oct. 1, 1991. There are only 32 scholarships assigned to the United States and applicants must have "proven intellectual and academic achievement of a high standard, integrity of character, interests in and respect for their fellow human beings, the ability to lead, and the

energy to use their talents to the full." The last of these qualities is usually, though not exclusively, demonstrated by participation and success in sports. Rhodes Scholarship applications must be completed and mailed by Oct. 22.

Mellon Fellowships in the Humanities: Awarded to outstanding seniors or recent graduates in the humanities who will pursue doctorates in the humanities, in preparation for careers as teachers and scholars. Mellon Fellowships provide a stipend of \$12,000 plus payment of tuition to the graduate school one chooses to attend. To be eligible, a senior or recent graduate must be a United States or Canadian citizen, present evidence of outstanding academic promise, and wish to begin graduate study in the humanities. Students interested in Mellon Fellowships need to complete the application process by Dec. 3. Students will be required to submit the results of the GRE, General Test, and are therefore advised to check test registration deadlines.

Fulbright Grants: Awarded to graduate students for study and research abroad in academic fields or for professional training in the creative and performing arts. Grants range from a full grant, which covers one year of tuition, books and maintenance in one foreign country, to a variety of partial grants which cover transportation costs only and/or supplement the applicant's own personal funds. Also available under the Fulbright program are teaching assistantships in English in Afghanistan, Ecuador, France and Germany. To be eligible for any of the Fulbright grants, an applicant must be a U.S. citizen at the time of application and hold a bachelor's degree by the beginning date of the grant. Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but must have four years of relevant training or study. All applicants are required to have sufficient proficiency in the language of the host country to carry out their proposed study or research. Fulbright applications must be mailed by Oct. 31.
