REGION III OF THE MISSOURI ASSOCIATION of the Future Homemakers of America will meet on Saturday at the University. About 400 students from 20 area high schools are expected to participate in the conference with the theme focusing on careers in home economics, "Learn it, Develop it, Pass it on!" Two campus representatives will speak at the opening session at 9:30 a.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. University President Charles J. McClain will welcome the homemakers to campus and Peggy Schoen, a former national FHA officer and a freshman from Monett, will deliver the keynote address. Meeting coordinators are Cindy Crawford, a senior majoring in vocational home economics from Unionville, and Susan Davis, a senior majoring in home economics communication from Corydon, Iowa.

THE RED BARN ARTS AND CRAFTS FAIR will feature the works of about 85 artists from the tri-state area from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 12 noon to 5 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 1, in Pershing Arena. Exhibits will include oil paintings, watercolors, acrylics, photography, ceramics, weaving, wood-working, and other art and craft work. At 2 p.m. Saturday, the NMSU Jazz Ensemble will perform and at 1:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 1, the Pinchpenny Players will present a children's show, both as part of the fair. Admission is free to all.
