A CORNERSTONE LAYING CEREMONY for the Natatorium and Administration/Classroom Building is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. Sept. 15 at the Administration/Classroom Building. State Sen. Norman Merrell of Monticello will be the principal speaker. Lewis C. Wes Cook of Kansas City, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge AF and AM of Missouri, will conduct the ceremonies.

University offices will be closed at 4:30 p.m. so that faculty, staff and students will be able to attend.

CAROLYN BOND, wife of Missouri's Governor Kit Bond, will be the speaker at the University Dames opening breakfast at 9:30 a.m. Sept. 18 at the Bonfoey Inn.
