Jerry Mayhew, Health, Physical Education and Recreation, and Gary Sells, Science, will have their paper, "Relationship of Brachial Pulse Wave Components and  $VO_{2max}$  to Endurance Running Performance," published in "Journal of Sports, Medicine and Physical Fitness." Mayhew presented a program "Being Well is Being Fit: Exercise and Well-Being" at the Missouri College Personnel Association meeting Nov. 5 in Columbia.

Gene Wunder, Business, attended a conference on "Stabilization Policies: Lessons from the 1970s and Implications for the 1980s." The conference, co-sponsored by the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis and Washington University, was Oct. 19-20 in St. Louis.
