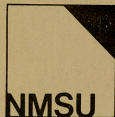

THE CENSUS BUREAU will conduct its national census of population and housing during this semester. The work, which depicts the first lunar landing, will become part of an inventory of art to be periodically exhibited in state buildings and in colleges and universities throughout Missouri.
