## Taiwan Scholarship Program

The American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) is administering the 1991-92 competition for the AASCU/Taiwan Scholarship Program. The scholarships, funded by the Taiwan Ministry of Education, offer students the chance to begin or continue Chinese language studies at the Mandarin Training Center in Taipei, Taiwan. Fifteen scholarships will be awarded for the 1991-92 academic year. The scholarship awards include full payment of tuition and miscellaneous fees at the Mandarin Training Center, and monthly stipends of approximately \$300 per month for 12 months.

Applicants must demonstrate a serious

desire to study the Chinese language and have the ability to live independently in another culture. To apply, you must submit application forms, three letters of recommendation, a personal statement, college transcripts up to fall 1990 grades, and other related materials.

**Connie Jones**, professor of English. **Betsy Otten**, associate professor of English. **Paula Presley**, assistant editor of *Thomas Jefferson University Press*, and **Arnold Preussner**, associate professor of English, presented papers at the Sixteenth Century Studies Conference in St. Louis, Oct. 25-27. The interdisciplinary conference attracts scholars interested in the Early Modern period from around the world. Jones presented her paper, "The Context Connection: The Industry of Tying Context to Text." Otten who chaired the session titled "Neo-Latin Literature and the Classical Tradition." Presley presented her paper, "Lollardism Found in William Caxton's Prologues, Epilogues, and Interpolations." Preussner presented his paper, "The Threatened Woman in Jonsonian Comedy." Professor of History and Religion, executive secretary of the Sixteenth Century Studies Conference, was recognized for his service to Early Modern scholars and the promotion of interdisciplinary scholarship world wide.
