HOMECOMING 1979 will begin at 5 p.m. Wednesday with the queen candidates' parade around campus. On Thursday, a pep feast will be served from 4:30-6:30 p.m. at Red Barn Park for the hall residents. The pep rally will be at 6:30 p.m. at Stokes Stadium. In case of rain, it will be held in Kirk Gym. Voting for Homecoming Queen will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday on third floor of the Student Union Building. Crowning of the queen will be at 8 p.m. Thursday in Baldwin Auditorium.

The Homecoming dance will be from 9 p.m. to 12 midnight Friday in Kirk Gym. The DeCounter Brothers Band from Macomb, Ill., will play selections from groups that include the Doobie Brothers, Fleetwood Mac and Little River Band. The dance is open to all students, faculty and staff at no admission. Attire is semi-formal. Free refreshments will be provided.

The Homecoming Parade "Saturday Night Live" will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday with more than 140 entries. The parade will begin at the corner of Franklin and Buchanan streets and proceed down Franklin to Red Barn Park. The pre-game show will begin at 1 p.m. at Stokes Stadium. Winners of the residence hall decorations, floats, pep rally and Alumni Fair displays will be announced during the show. At 2 p.m. the Bulldogs will take on the Mules of Central Missouri State University at Warrensburg.

At 8 p.m. Saturday the Ozark Mountain Daredevils and Missouri will present a concert in Baldwin Auditorium.

Alumni activities on Friday will include the Alumni Fair from 5-7 p.m. in the Quiet Lounge of the SUB. It will feature exhibits from campus organizations and divisions. The Alumni Banquet will be at 7 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the SUB. Tickets may be obtained today and Tuesday in the Alumni Office in McKinney Center. Tickets for alumni, faculty and staff members are \$4.50. On Saturday, the Alumni Fair will be on display from 10 a.m. to 12 noon in the Quiet Lounge. At 11 a.m. a luncheon will be served in the Georgian Room.
