Amabile To Perform Oct. 23

The Lyceum Series will present an evening of beautiful and exciting music as the Amabile Piano Quartet performs in concert at 8 p.m., Oct. 23, in Baldwin Auditorium. This concert is funded in part by the Missouri Arts Council. Free tickets will be available Oct. 18-20 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB. The use of cameras and recording equipment during the performance is prohibited.

The Amabile Piano Quartet, a vibrant ensemble of exciting young virtuosos, is composed of soloists Marian Hahn, piano; Peter Winograd, violin; Kathleen Mattis, viola; and Lisa Lancaster, cello.

Hahn was a winner in the 1976 Leventritt Competition which launched her distinguished solo career. By winning one of the top prizes in the 1988 Naumburg International Violin Competition, Winograd continues to establish himself as one of the most promising young American violinists. Mattis assumed the job as associate principal viola in the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra at the age of 21. Lancaster has concertized throughout the United States both as a soloist and chamber musician.

The Quartet brings to the concert hall the skills of virtuosic performers with a compelling love of chamber music and the ability to project their vibrant individual personalities into an exciting performance. The Quartet performs a major portion of the concert with Brahms Piano Quartet in C minor,

opus 60, a work that is considered one of the masterworks of chamber music. Also on the program is an early piano quartet by Mozart—the G minor.

Amabile is funded by two state arts councils (Missouri and Illinois) and by two regional arts councils covering 14 states (Mid-America Arts Alliance and the Southern Arts Federation). In 1985, the National Endowment funded the chamber group Trio Cassatt to expand their touring territory. This grant was amended to fund the Amabile Piano Quartet.

Trio Cassatt was formed in 1980 by three members of the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra who had performed in various chamber ensembles. Within a year, they were a part of the touring program of the Missouri Arts Council which subsidized their tours to outstate Missouri. By 1983, they were put on the Mid-America Arts Alliance Regional Touring Program.

After nearly four years of performances, the Trio had all but exhausted the major repertoire for string trio. Many months were spent tracking down obscure works at major music libraries including the Library of Congress. They began to feel that they wanted to expand the group (and the repertoire) by the permanent addition of a pianist. With the National Endowment grant expansion of the group was possible as well as added repertoire for the piano quartet, piano trio and various duos.
