Hagerty Named Educator of the Year

Randy Hagerty, associate professor of political science was announced as the 1999 Educator of the Year at an April 8 banquet.

Hagerty began teaching at Truman in 1990. He holds both bachelor's and master's degrees from Texas Tech University. Hagerty received his doctorate from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign.

"I'd like to express my deepest gratitude to the students I have taught and who nominated me," Hagerty said. "I have a positive working relationship with my colleagues in political science. They make teaching enjoyable and rewarding."

This is the 10th year the university has honored an educator of the year. The Educator of the Year program was organized by Student Senate, Alpha Phi Sigma, Pershing Society, Phi Eta Sigma and Phi Kappa Phi. The committee was comprised of two students from the sponsoring organizations and one student at large.

"This award is so significant because it is all student initiated and student run. It gives them the chance to honor and celebrate the professors," said Kristen Riebeling, Educator of the Year co-chair.

The nominees go through an extensive process to gain this honor. Students could nominate any professor. Those nominees were contacted to accept the nomination and receive an essay prompt. The essays and nominations were considered and 12 semifinalists were chosen. Next, each professor's classes were surveyed and six finalists were picked. Finally the classes were observed and the winner was chosen.

"Education must go beyond the accumulation of detail to instill an ability to think about what the facts mean and to live in a world in which the only constant is change," Hagerty wrote in his essay to the Educator of the Year
