Missouri Government Internship Program Application Deadline Extended

Due to a large number of requests for interns, the Missouri Government Internship Program committee has extended the application deadline.

The Missouri Government Internship Program offers a unique opportunity for students to intern at the Capitol in Jefferson City, Mo., with a public official, legislator or state agency during the spring 2004 semester. The internship, which is open to all majors, provides an inside look at state government.

Interns are assigned to public officials or offices based upon compatibility and interests. Care is taken to consider each student's major, political orientation, career goals and other preferences. The goal is to increase the probability that each placement becomes a successful learning experience.

"The internship provided a great opportunity to see first-hand how our laws are

made and changed," former intern Kevin Selzer said. "In addition, you make a lot of great contacts that can potentially help with future employment or references."

The interns live in Jefferson City during the spring semester and receive a stipend of \$2,200. Interns may earn up to 15 hours of credit.

Please turn completed applications in to McClain Hall 102. A screening committee will review the applications and interviews will be conducted within the next few weeks.

The Homecoming Committee recently made a donation of \$2,750 to the United Way of Adair County. These donations were collected as part of the Homecoming charity.

Another step was taken toward the United Way goal Oct. 22, when the residential halls held the Food Fast. During the Food Fast, students were given the option of donating a meal from their block meal

plan or donating money to the United Way. Sodexo donates \$1.65 for each student who chooses to donate a meal from their block plan. A total of \$1,534.50 was collected as part of this effort.

The campaign is currently at 90 percent of its \$50,000 goal. Group leaders will continue to make contacts and collect pledge cards for the next 10 days.

♻️ CARDBOARD

Corrugated cardboard only. Please flatten and stack cardboard. Drop-off sites are available by most dumpsters on campus.

Not acceptable

*Wax coated cardboard
Feed/Seed sacks
Pop/Soda carriers
Anything with food scraps*

♻️ HARD BOOKS

Can be placed in book recycle containers or placed with papers.

Acceptable

*All books
Spiral binders
Books with glued ends*

♻️ SHREDDED PAPER

All shredded paper must be in bags and tied securely.

Acceptable

*White paper
Colored paper
Any paper that can be placed in mixed office.*

♻️ PRINTER CARTRIDGES

♻️ NEWSPAPERS

Can be tied with a string, put in paper bags, placed in a cardboard box or placed loose in newsprint containers.

NOTE: Advertising supplements that come in the newspapers can stay with the newspapers when recycled.

♻️ MAGAZINES

Only slick or shiny magazines and catalogs accepted.

Examples

Time, Newsweek, National Geographic, Catalogs, Etc.

♻️ CANS

All aluminum cans are acceptable. Please rinse the cans and remove labels if possible.

♻️ GLASS

Glass must be rinsed. Lids are not accepted.

♻️ MIXED OFFICE PAPER

Can be tied with string, placed in cardboard box or paper bags or placed loose in mixed office paper containers.

♻️ PLASTIC BOTTLES AND JUGS

Check the bottom of the container for the recycling logo. Inside the logo is a number identifying the type of plastic. Generally, plastics accepted for recycling at Truman are #1 and #2 only. Containers must be rinsed. Caps and lids may be left on.

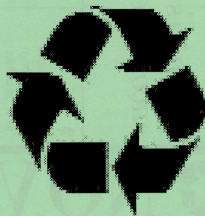
