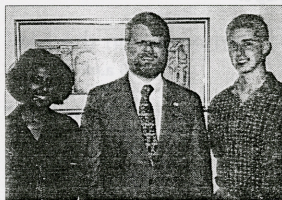

American Chemical Society Honors Truman Undergraduate Achievement

Two Truman chemistry students were honored this spring at an awards banquet hosted by the Mark Twain Local Section of the American Chemical Society. Samila Mihindukulasuri of Sri Lanka and Jason Gruenhagen of Nevada, Mo., both May 1998 chemistry graduates, were named Outstanding Chemistry Majors. Their names, along with the previous recipients from Truman, will be inscribed on a plaque displayed in Science Hall.

Mihindukulasuri will continue her studies at Duke University. Gruenhagen will pursue doctoral studies at Iowa State University.

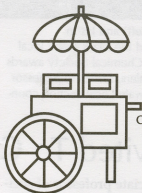
