Harry Truman was born May 8, 1884. A celebration of his 115th birthday is planned at the University May 7.

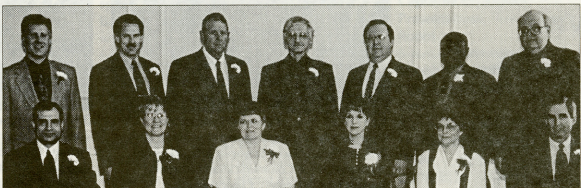

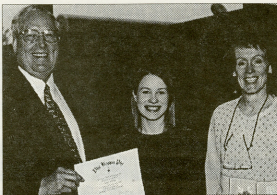

## India Study Abroad Offered

Students looking for an opportunity to broaden their academic as well as cultural horizons will have the opportunity to participate in a three-week December interim course in India. Ranjita Misra, assistant professor of health and exercise science, invites students to accompany her to New Delhi, Calcutta and Bhubaneswar from Dec. 16, 1999 to Jan. 3, 2000.

This is a study abroad experience that may count for up to three hours of health science elective, community health or intercultural perspective courses. The trip, which is open to all students, costs \$3,000.

The course will focus on socio-cultural and economic dimensions of health care in the country. Misra said that it will "give students exposure to a different health care system—one in which the alternative medical practices of homeopathy and *ayurvedy* (herbal medication) are nationalized institutions."

Students will visit the World Health Organization Office, academic institutions, international agencies, Mother Teresa's camp and the Taj Mahal.

## Fulbright Recipient to Work in Korea

**Laura Klimpel, senior English major from St. Louis**, is the recipient of a 1999-2000 Fulbright Teaching Assistantship. Laura will spend the following year in Korea both teaching English and studying Korean educational methods.

Laura is a student advisor in Ryle Hall, a member of Phi Kappa Phi National Honor Society and Pi Delta Phi National French Honor Society.

Fulbright grants are awarded by the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board and the Institute of International Education (IIE). The awards are open to

students as well as faculty interested in international study or research. Fulbright grants typically cover travel, maintenance, fees, tuition and health insurance. Thirty English Teaching Assistantships for Korea were awarded in the 1999-2000 competition. The grants are for one year, with the possibility of renewal. Language proficiency is not required for consideration of applicants, as intensive language study is included in the training sessions. Grantees live with Korean families and teach approximately 20 hours of English classes per week at local secondary schools.
