SUMMER COMMENCEMENT is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Friday, August 12, in Stokes Stadium. In case of rain, commencement exercises will be held in the Pershing Arena.

All candidates for graduation should assemble in Baldwin Auditorium at 6:15 p.m. on Friday for announcement of honors. At 7 p.m. the traditional academic procession will begin.

Speaking at the commencement exercises will be Robert P. Ewing, president of Bankers Life and Casualty Company. He is a native of Kirksville and a NMSU graduate who holds a B.S. in Business Education.

"HAY FEVER" by Noel Coward will open tomorrow night at the Hannibal Ice House Theatre. Nightly performances will be given at 8:15 p.m. through Sunday, August 14.

Additional invitations can be bought for 20¢ each or six for \$1. Students must present a graduation fees receipt in order to receive their invitations.

AUGUST has been selected as an Electrical Energy Conservation Month by the Kirksville Energy Awareness Project. A Task Force was recently appointed to study and recommend methods of energy conservation. Some suggestions are: turn off unused lights, set thermostats at 78 degrees during the summer, turn off machines (motors), restrict elevator usage, and turn off exhaust fans at night.

In May, a federally funded grant of \$30,625 was awarded to Kirksville residents to conduct a study of industry, government, and the general public in the use of energy. The project is being sponsored by the University.
