NORTHEAST NOTES

Dr. Charles Gerdes, Science, has been selected for the American Registry of Professional Entomologists (Systematics Sections), a national organization to advance standards and ethics in entomology.

Bob Graber, Social Science, presented a paper entitled "Schism as a Normal Mode of Conflict Resolution" at the Dec. 3 meeting of the American Anthropological Association in Los Angeles.

Jim Barnes, Language and Literature, will have two poems appearing in the anthology, "Songs from Turtle Island: Contemporary American Indian Poetry," to be published this year in Yugoslavia. His original work will appear side by side with a translation into Macedonian.

Ken Stilwell, Mathematics, was quoted as president of the Missouri Mathematics Association for the Advancement of Teacher Training in a series of articles which appeared in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch on Nov. 15, 16 and 17.

Charles G.
