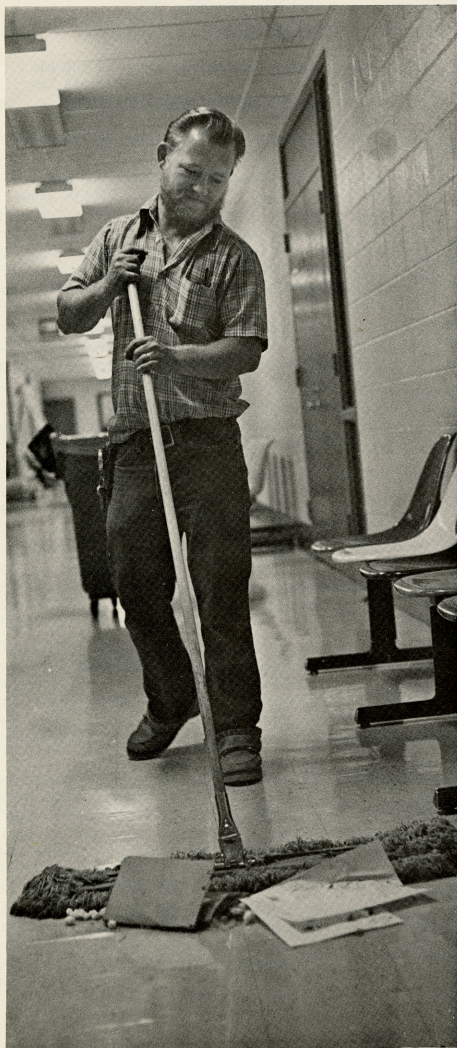
NORTHEAST NOTES

An award for a *Clean sweep*

Arlie Garrett is a man of few words who does his job as custodian of the Industrial Education Building well enough to win the first Custodial Staff of the Month award given by the physical plant office and the Student Senate.

Garrett won the award personally because he is the entire full-time custodial staff in IE Building. Students clean the shops in the building, leaving the hallways, classrooms and offices for Garrett.

Custodial supervisor Carrol White inspects the buildings on campus and chooses the building staff to be given the award. The certificate itself is presented by the Student Senate in order to make students more aware of the work done by custodians.

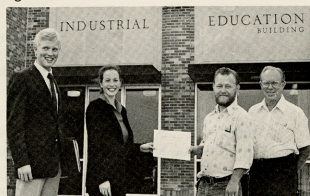
The Custodial Staff of the Month award is the newest of several award systems started at the University to increase student interest and awareness in the non-academic workings of the University.

The Idea of the Month and HELP awards were started last spring through the Dean of Students Office.

The Idea of the Month offers students a chance to make suggestions on ways to improve the University. The best suggestion is chosen each month and a T-shirt given to the winner.

The HELP award is given each month to a University staff person who has been helpful, energetic, likable and patient toward students. Nominations are sent to the Dean of Students Office.
