Hunter to be parade grand marshal



B.D. (Bud) Hunter ('50) has been chosen to serve as grand marshal for the 1995 Homecoming parade. Hunter is the chairman, chief executive and founder of Hunto, Inc., a major intermediate steel processor with headquarters in Town and

Country, Mo.

Hunto is listed on the New York Stock Exchange and was listed as one of the top 50 growth companies in the St. Louis area in 1994.

Hunter also manages personal and family investments in numerous privately owned companies involved in nursing homes, real estate development, radio sta-

tions, restaurants, farms, Jiffy Lubes and aviation.

He serves on the board of directors of several other large publicly traded companies including Service Corporation International (NYSE), Cash America International (NYSE), Celebrity, Inc. (NASD) and Mark Twain Bancshares Inc. (NASD).

In designating a grand marshal, the University is able to recognize and honor a distinguished alumnus. Hunter also gave the commencement address at Northeast in August of 1986. He was honored as a distinguished alumnus of Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity in 1970.

Hunter is a native of Missouri who resides in the St. Louis area. He has two sons and two daughters. ♡

Nunsense II to be performed

the sisters aspire to stardom, especially since they have heard that a talent scout may be in the audience for their show.

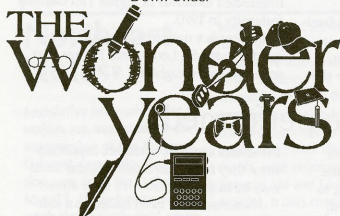

Female aviation pioneer to visit



Female aviation pioneer Elizabeth Strohfus will visit campus to share her experiences as a pilot dur-

ing World War II. She will tell her story through a slide presentation and lecture on Oct. 23 at 8 p.m. in Ryle Hall main lounge as part of the Ryle Hall Lecture Series. Aviation-related items, donated by Tim Scherrer, facilities supervisor, will also be on display during the lecture.

Strohfus began flying airplanes in 1942 in Faribault, Minn. World War II created a shortage of male pilots, so an experimental program was started. This program employed women pilots to ferry planes to England. Gradually they also began to tow targets and engaged in mock chemical warfare.

During this time, the acronym WASP

was adopted. WASP stands for Women Air Force Service Pilots.

Even though WASPs flew cargo, top secret weapons and personnel during the war, they did not receive militarization. During their time of duty, 38 WASPs died and were buried without military honors. However, in 1979, the Air Force officially accepted the WASPs; and in 1984, each woman was awarded the Victory medal for her service during the war.

Strohfus has continued flying since her WASP days. In 1990, at the age of 71, she flew an F-16. Her many experiences are recorded in her book, *Love at First Flight*.

Assistant College

Professor Christopher Gregory hopes that Strohfus will serve as an inspiration to all who attend. "This is an exciting program for everyone," Gregory said. "Sometimes you have to be trailblazers ... it's worth the sacrifices." ☛

Flu shots for faculty and staff

Free flu shots will be offered to all faculty and staff covered by the University's insurance, as well as spouses who have elected coverage. Part-time faculty and staff and spouses not covered under the insurance plan may elect to receive the immunization for a \$5 charge.

Flu shots will be available on a first-come, first-served basis at the Student Health Clinic, McKinney Center. Shots will be administered from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., Oct. 16-20; from 9 to 11 a.m., Oct. 23-27; and from 4 to 7 p.m., Oct. 23 and 25.

If you prefer, you may still obtain the shot from your private physician and it will be reimbursable for up to \$15 by filing a claim with the insurance carrier. Any office charges incurred will be subject to regular repayment guidelines. ☛
