Northeast To Receive \$100,000 Computer Lab

KPMG Peat Marwick and Apple, Inc. have announced the awarding of a computer lab valued at \$100,000 to Northeast. The lab will be equipped with Macintosh computers, printers and software. The University will also receive grants to furnish the Macintosh computer laboratory, which will be located in Violette Hall 102.

All Northeast graduates currently employed by KPMG Peat Marwick contributed to the project and these funds were matched by the KPMG Peat Marwick Foundation and Apple, Inc.

Awareness of Disabilities Day Planned

The Services for Individuals with Disabilities Office, a student/staff support service program located in Violette Hall 175, will hold a promotional awareness day April 5. The theme for the day is "Students With Disabilities Add to NMSU."

Davis encourages everyone to take part in the Awareness Day. "This is not a technology exhibit or workshop only for people who think they have certain kinds of disabilities, it's hopefully going to grow into a technology for learning workshop," he said.

The SID Office provides and coordinates support services to students with disabilities and serves as an information referral service for non-disabled students and the community. Services include assistance with orientation, handicapped parking, advocacy and guidance, classroom accommodation, faculty liaison, tutor referral, reader referral, interpreter/notetaker referral, housing referral, PCA referral, resource file material, test proctoring, independent living skills referral and agency liaison. These services are provided according to individual needs.

Jordan Davis, director of the office, said the office has registered and served

15 students. He emphasizes that anyone can utilize the office's services, open from 9-11 a.m. and 1-2:30 p.m. Monday-Thursday.

Davis said the office defines a disability as a physical or mental challenge that impairs some life functioning. A handicap is what you can't do as a result of a disability. Not all disabled individuals are handicapped if they have found ways to adapt.

"I always use the example of people who wear glasses. They are not severely disabled, but they certainly have a disability. Their vision is different than ours, therefore we call it a diminished visual acuity," Davis said.

For a relatively new office, established last semester, SID offers many services. Davis said policies and procedures for many of the services have already been established. For example, policies for specialized registration were finalized in March. Other services, such as tape recording the General Bulletin and class schedules have already been completed. Davis said they've even had one request from a blind student for somebody to either record or read to them the Northeast Today.

Good Keynotes Education Conference

Dr. Thomas L. Good, professor in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction and Research Associate at the Center for Research in Social Behavior, University of Missouri-Columbia, will be the keynote speaker at the 1991 "Bridging the Gap...Finding a Common Ground Toward Equality in Education Conference" on April 12 and 13.

The topic of Good's presentation is *The Role of Expectations on Classroom Learning*. In it, he will address his latest research in teacher expectations and the interaction of teacher and student expectations.

Good is the present editor for the *Elementary School Journal*, and is advisory editor for several other publications. He has also written books, textbooks and magazine articles and has received nu-

merous grants for his studies and research. Good was a senior Fulbright Fellow in Australia in 1984. He has given addresses and presentations in Mexico, the Netherlands, Australia, Sweden, and Canada, as well as many universities in the United States.

Before he joined the University of Missouri in 1971, Good was a member of the faculty at the University of Texas-Austin. He received his doctorate in Educational Psychology from Indiana University in 1968.

Northeast Sponsors Study Abroad Program

Northeast Missouri State University in cooperation with Tamsui Oxford College is offering a summer program (July) in Taiwan. It is designed not only to study Chinese in Taiwan, but also to give students a real life experience in Chinese culture.

The four-week program begins with two weeks at Tamsui Oxford College with formal classroom instruction in the Chinese language (approximately 30 hours). During the third week, the students will live with host families, allowing them to observe and experience the Chinese lifestyle. The students will spend the final week touring the island of Taiwan. Students will increase their language and communication skills, their understanding of Chinese culture, and also get to know Chinese people by interacting in their society. Students will be granted three credit hours transferred from Tamsui Oxford College upon successful completion of the program.

The cost for the student for room and board, instruction (in Chinese) and traveling in Taiwan is \$800 for the four-week program. Round trip transportation is not included, but is approximately \$1,000 per person.

Senate Passes Economic Survival Act

The Missouri Senate passed Sen. James Mathewson's "Economic Survival Act of 1991" March 14 following several days of debate and a series of proposed amendments. The measure, if approved by the House of Representatives, would allow voters to determine whether to raise taxes by \$455 million annually to make Missouri education more accessible and competitive. The Senate vote was 24-10.

Supporters of public and private higher education in Missouri, through Missourians for Higher Education, have been working for several years for passage of a measure that would increase state funding for higher education. MHE is a consortium of nearly 50 public and private, two- and four-year colleges and universities, including Northeast.

Among the 50 states, Missouri ranks in the 20s in personal wealth but in the 40s in state support for higher education. The proposed package includes \$247 million for colleges and universities, about \$185 million for public schools and \$24 million for job development.

The Senate plan would raise \$179.5 million by capping the deduction for federal income taxes paid at \$10,000 on individual Missouri returns, raise \$170 million by increasing the state sales tax by 3/8 of a cent to 4.6 percent, raise \$21 million by increasing the state cigarette tax four cents to 17 cents a pack and raise \$85.4 million by increasing the corporate income tax rate from 5 percent to 6.5 percent for firms with taxable incomes of more than \$335,000 and reducing their present 100 percent deductibility of federal income taxes to 50 percent.

If passed, the tax increase would be phased in over three years beginning in January 1992. In exchange for increased funding, colleges and universities would be required to carry out reforms and mission enhancements. If approved by the Legislature, the issue will be submitted to a vote of the people in November 1991.

Asian Authority to Speak on Campus

Zillur R. Khan, chair of the political science department at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, will speak on "India, the Middle East and the Superpowers" April 5 at 9 a.m. in the SUB Tangerine Room.

Khan has published several books and dozens of scholarly articles on constitutional models, political autonomy and leadership roles in developing nations. Since 1988, he has twice served as a consultant to the United Nations Development Program and to the Government of Bangladesh, and has testified about Afghanistan before the U.S. House of Representatives Subcommittee on South Asian and Pacific Affairs.

Khan, a graduate of Dhaka University and the Claremont Graduate Program in Government, has received Fulbright, Danforth, National Science Foundation and Asian Studies Awards. He has done presentations at national and international conferences, along with a multitude of television, radio and newspaper interviews based on his work with major South Asian political figures.

A reception will follow his talk. Khan will also be available to visit with interested persons throughout the day. His presentation is sponsored by the Missouri South Residential College and the Views of India class. The public is welcome.

Minority Affairs Workshop Features Akbar



The third annual Missouri Minority Affairs Directors Workshop will be held at Northeast April 5. This cross-cultural event will feature Dr. Na'im Akbar. All students, faculty and staff are encouraged to attend Akbar's lecture titled "Diversity: Myth vs. Reality" at 7 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room.

Akbar is a celebrated lecturer, author, scholar, teacher, theoretician and one of the most recognized experts in the field of African-American psychology. He is the author of several widely acclaimed books including *Chains and Images of Psychological Slavery* and *From Miseducation to Education*. Akbar is past president of the National Association of Black Psychologists and is currently on the editorial board of the *Journal of Black Studies*. He is executive director of a privately owned consultant

company, Mind Productions and Associates. His keen awareness of issues that affect people of color, particularly those of African descent, and his no-nonsense approach toward these issues has garnered him worldwide recognition and accolades. Akbar has lectured at hundreds of locations in the United States and in numerous countries including England, Portugal, Ghana, Egypt and Brazil. He has also appeared on "Donahue," "Geraldo," "The Oprah Winfrey Show" and "Tony Brown's Journal."

"There's a lot of work that's going to happen over a period of 10 to 20 years. The major thing to look at is the administration's commitment," he said. He also noted the overwhelming cooperation shown by student organizations and the entire campus community. If people are interested in volunteering, they should stop by the office, which does keep volunteer records.

Physical obstacles are already being overcome. Davis noted that parking blocks in front of the handicapped parking spaces have been removed because when people park in those spaces, they can't get a wheelchair over the blocks.

Davis received his bachelor's in elementary education from American University in Washington, D.C. He received his master's in rehabilitation counseling from Coppin State College, where he also worked with the hearing impaired.

He has worked as a vocational rehab counselor for the hearing impaired and also was the director of the Client Assistance Project, an ombudsman program for the disabled in the District of Columbia. He holds a doctorate in rehabilitation administration from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale. In addition to teaching part time at the University and Moberly Area Junior College, Davis is pastor of the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Moberly, Mo.

One of the major projects currently under way is the creation of an accessibility map of campus to let people know what accessible opportunities exist on campus. Davis said although some may assume the map to be incomplete, he expects it will improve as the years go by.

"We are looking forward to a lot of

changes to some of the buildings and some of our attitudes," Davis said.

A Canon Color Copier is now in Printing Services on a trial basis. Anyone needing color copies or color transparencies may utilize this service. 8½ x 11 prints cost \$1.50 and 11 x 17 prints cost \$3.

Ten \$1,000 scholarships will be given to outstanding students from Missouri public four-year colleges and universities by the Missouri Council on Public Higher Education. Eligible students must have a minimum of 75 credit hours and be planning for a career as a math, science or foreign language teacher at the elementary or secondary level. Applications are available in the Financial Aid Office, McClain Hall 100, and should be submitted no later than May 10, 1991.

The Police Recruitment and Education Program was signed into law by President Bush. This amends the Higher Education Act to extend the Perkins Loan cancellation programs to students and in-service officers who pursue a career as local, state or federal law enforcement and correctional officers. The Perkins Loan program provides low interest loans to students with financial need in post secondary education. Loans can be granted up to \$18,000 for those in graduate or professional programs, \$9,000 for a student who completes two years of a bachelor's program, and \$4,500 for any other student. PREP provides that the Perkins Loan be completely forgiven at the rate of 15 percent for each of the first two years of service, 20 percent for the third and fourth years, and 30 percent for the fifth year of service as sworn officers.
