WATERCOLOR ARTIST JACK VALLEE will be on campus through tomorrow as part of his residency in the Fine Arts Division. He will give a lecture on the history of watercolor in the U.S. tonight at 7 in the Little Theatre of Baldwin Hall and a workshop for watercolorists at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow on the third floor of Baldwin Hall.

Admission to both events is free and open to the public. Those interested in attending the workshop for watercolorists are asked to pre-register with the Fine Arts Division. The "Watercolors U.S.A." display will continue through Sunday.

DR. RICHARD LOEPPKY from the University of Missouri chemistry department will be the guest speaker at the American Chemical Society meeting today at 4:30 p.m. in 240 Science Hall. He will speak on "Nitrosamines and Cancer--From the Environment to the Disease." The meeting is open to the public.

EDDIE DANIELS, JAZZ SAXAPHONIST, will be the guest artist for the Phi Mu Alpha Jazz Festival night concert Saturday at 8 in Baldwin Auditorium. Daniels played with the Thad Jones/Mel Lewis Jazz Orchestra for seven years and now is a studio musician in New York.

The festival begins at 8 a.m. with 48 junior high and high school bands from Missouri and Iowa competing for awards. Competition will be held in six classes in morning and afternoon sessions.

Tickets are available through Friday in the SUB and at the Baldwin Hall ticket window Saturday. The price of \$1.75 per person will admit the bearer to the competition during the day and to the night concert.

POLITICS ... The Students for the Students' Party will meet tomorrow at 6 p.m. in Room 5 of the SUB. Elections for Student Senate and Supreme Court are April 14. All interested students are urged to attend.

JANUARY-A RECORD MONTH FOR ADMISSIONS ... The admissions office has reported that 315 first-time freshmen applications were received this past month. This is the largest application total for January according to the records for the last seven years.

The February goal is 300 applications, which is an average of 11 per day. As of Feb. 9, 120 applications were received or a total of 13 per day, according to Kent Farnsworth, director of admissions. It is hoped that freshmen enrollment for 1977 will meet that of 1974 when 1296 freshmen were enrolled. Farnsworth attributes the increase to the combined University effort.

GRADUATION APPLICATIONS ... Undergraduates planning to graduate this spring must file a graduate application in the Registrar's Office by March 1. Graduate applications for master's degrees are due in the Graduate Studies Office by March 18 for students planning to graduate this spring.

THE AASCU COMMITTEE of the National Endowment for the Humanities has nominated Darrell W. Krueger, dean of instruction, Robert V. Schnucker, Social Science, and Leon C. Karel, Fine Arts, as candidates for panelists to review grant proposals submitted by those wishing to obtain NEH grants. They were chosen after a study of 600 resumes of candidates.

SPORTS ... The NMSU wrestling team will have ten members of its team competing in the MIAA Championship Tournament this Saturday at Central Missouri State University. NMSU finished fourth in the tournament last year and has entered wrestlers in each of the ten matches.

The women's track team will be in Columbia this weekend for the University of Missouri Invitational Meet.

In other sports action, the NMSU tennis team will host its first home meet of the season on Sunday. The Bulldogs face Washington University at 9 a.m. and Columbia College at 4 p.m.

"ASHES AND DIAMONDS," international award-winning Polish film, will be shown tonight at 8 in Baldwin Hall Auditorium. The movie deals with the resistance movement against communism and the effects of war on moral decision, according to Jim Severns of the theatre department.

The movie is being sponsored by the University Players and is part of the Film Club schedule. Admission is free to Film Club season ticket holders and \$1.25 for others.

ADAIR COUNTY PROSECUTOR, Meredith Ratcliff, will speak to the Jurisprudence Society tomorrow at 8 in the SUB. His topic will be "The Prosecutor's Role in Today's Society." The meeting is open to the public.

SURVEY SHOWS BETTER JOB OPPORTUNITIES ... A December survey of more than 600 public and private employers by the College Placement Council showed that graduates of the Class of '77 can look forward to better job opportunities at graduation.

Hiring of new college graduates is expected to increase by 12 per cent overall compared with last year. And for the first time since Dec., 1973, the council is predicting a rise in employment of liberal arts majors, perhaps by as much as eight per cent. Many employers say that 1976-77 may prove to be the top hiring year of the last four or five, the Council reports.
