Reading, Book Signing to Feature *Towards a Sociology of Schizophrenia*

Keith Doubt, associate professor of sociology, will read from and sign copies of his book *Toward a Sociology of Schizophrenia* at 7 p.m., Nov. 6, in the Truman Bookstore.

Doubt's book and this reading will appeal to both professionals and lay readers, sociologists and family members and friends of people with schizophrenia. Doubt will explain that critical features of society and social life are disclosed in the examination of schizophrenia.

Doubt writes, "From the sociological study of schizophrenia, we learn about what it means to be a human being. We learn about human character. Through the example of their suffering and survival of their affliction, people with schizophrenia

teach us about ourselves and what it means to be a member of society."

He wrote the book to "be an advocate for people with schizophrenia and an advocate for their recognition as a bona fide member of society." He wanted to "show how sociology can contribute to the personhood of people with schizophrenia."

Doubt says that one percent of the population suffers from schizophrenia.

Doubt received his doctorate from York University of Toronto in sociology.

This event is held as a part of the Truman Bookstore's Faculty Author lecture series. The book costs \$13.95; royalties from copies sold at the signing will be donated to the Northeast Missouri Alliance for the Mentally Ill.

Financial Aid Night Teleconference To Explain Student Financial Resources

Truman will take part in a teleconference to help students, their families and school administrators understand the financial opportunities available for college education. The teleconference will be at 7 p.m., Nov. 10, in the SUB Activities Room.

Secretary of Education Richard Riley and the Department's Office of Student Financial Assistance will join the Office of Legislation and Congressional Affairs in hosting this teleconference. A staff member from Rep. Kenny Hulshof's office will be at the Truman site to help answer questions and provide further assistance.

Several call-in questions from around the nation will be answered.

The 45-minute program will include or explain several things: how to obtain and complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid; an overview of the major student financial assistance programs, including Federal Pell Grants, Stafford Loans, PLUS Loan, Consolidation Loans, Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Federal Work-Study and Federal Perkins Loans; information on the most recent changes to the tax law that benefits students and their families; how the AmeriCorps program provides full-time educational awards in return for work in community service; and ideas for obtaining scholarships from companies, community organizations and other sources.

Musicians To Perform At Truman

Phi Mu Alpha, the Division of Fine Arts and the Yamaha Corporation will sponsor a master class and concert by two accomplished musicians. A free master class with Joseph Turrin and Phil Smith will be at 4 p.m., Nov. 11, in Baldwin Auditorium. A concert with the two artists and the University Wind Symphony with conductor Dan Peterson, and the University Trumpet Ensemble with Gregory Jones, director, will be at 7:30 p.m., Nov. 11, in Baldwin Auditorium.

Turrin, composer in residence, is an accomplished composer, conductor and piano player. His piece *Civil War Suite* was premiered by the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra on Feb. 16, 1997. Turrin will be accompanying Smith, the principal trumpet of the New York Philharmonic, as well as lecturing in classes.

Smith joined the New York Philharmonic as co-principal trumpet in October 1978, and became principal trumpet at the start of the 1988-89 season. A graduate of The Juilliard School and a former member

of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Smith has performed worldwide as a soloist with symphonic wind ensembles, brass bands and orchestras. He is also on the faculty of The Juilliard School.

A frequent performer with the Philharmonic Ensembles, he is featured in their New World Records recording of *Concerto for Trumpet and Five Instruments*, and as a member of the Philharmonic Brass Quintet, he has performed and recorded with The Canadian Brass.

Smith's latest solo recordings are available through his company, New Song Productions. Other recordings include Copland's *Quiet City* on Deutsche Grammophon, Haydn's *Trumpet Concerto* and Turrin's *Trumpet Concerto* on Philharmonic Radiothon recordings, and most recently a recording of the "Top Twenty" orchestral excerpts on the Summit label.

Smith has appeared as soloist and bandmaster with the Goteborg Brass Band, Black Dyke Mills, Hanmaford Silver Band and numerous Salvation Army Bands.

Israeli Archeologist and Director of Excavations To Give Presentation

Noted Israeli archeologist and director of the Bethsaida Excavations Dr. Rami Arav of Haifa, Israel, will present a slide-lecture at 8 p.m., Nov. 3, in the SUB Georgian Room. Arav, who is currently in the United States on a teaching exchange program at the University of Nebraska-Omaha, will present "New Finds at Bethsaida." The presentation is open to the University community.

Prior to the 8 p.m. lecture, Arav will show the documentary *Bethsaida: Discovery of a Lost City* at 7 p.m. in the SUB Georgian Room. Filmed on site by University of Nebraska Television, the documentary features the history of the site, current scholarly interpretations and the significance of the excavation. The documentary includes segments highlighting the involvement of Truman State University, that helped to underwrite the production costs.

Recent finds at Bethsaida have attracted international media coverage and have been the subject of growing scholarly investigations. The first volume in a

planned series of four was published in 1995 by Truman's Thomas Jefferson University Press. The second volume is scheduled for release by the same press in 1998. Truman is a member of the Bethsaida Excavations Project, an international consortium that includes U.S., German, English, Canadian and Israeli institutions.

Each year Truman students participate in the archeological work at Bethsaida as part of the Mideast Studies Abroad program. Next year's trip will include sites in Turkey, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan and Egypt, in addition to the archeological site at Bethsaida, where hands-on training and experience is gained by actual work on the excavation. The first information session for next year's Bethsaida trip will be at 5:30 p.m., Nov. 10 in McClain Hall 212.
