Dr. Gordon Richardson, Education, was awarded the Phi Delta Kappa Distinguished Service Award at the annual Kickoff Breakfast of the NMSU chapter of PDK.

Marlow Ediger, Education, had his manuscript, "Philosophy of Education in the Language Arts Curriculum," accepted for publication in **Lasning**, published in Sweden by the Swedish International Reading Association.
