IMPROPER USE OF STATE VEHICLES has arisen as a problem at NMSU. Three areas in particular have proven problematic:

- 1) Violations of traffic laws while driving a state vehicle are the responsibility of the driver. Any fines incurred must be absorbed by the driver and not the University.

- 2) Driving a state van containing more than ten students, without a chauffeurs' license, is illegal.

- 3) Faculty and staff members who request the use of state vehicles may not permit students to drive the vehicles unless the faculty and staff members have agreed to be personally responsible for the students' actions while driving the vehicles and have received permission from the Safety and Security Office for named students to drive.
