THIS WEEK...

A FOOD DRIVE will begin today for families in Northeast Missouri. Boxes will be placed in the residence halls and in other buildings. Students and faculty are asked to contribute staples, including canned fruits and vegetables, flour, sugar and peanut butter. These foods will be distributed through a network of churches which are forming around a North Missouri Food Bank and by the local Community Action Agency.
