CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS**Article V, Section 2.4**

The Student Senate shall have the power to reject or confirm all Presidential appointments to the Senate and all appointments on behalf of the Student Association.

Article III, Section 1.2

The Student Senate shall also provide for a voting member to occupy a seat to be designated for a minority student.

Article VII

The Student Senate shall consist of the following standing committees: Academic Affairs, Public Relations, Senate Administration, and Student Affairs.
