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Lyceum Presents Chamber Concert

The Lyceum Series will present a concert featuring the Rosewood Chamber Consort at 8 p.m., March 6, in Baldwin Auditorium. Financial assistance for this performance has been provided by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The Rosewood Chamber Consort was formed in 1979 to present a great variety of music not often performed or

recorded. In addition to the great masters including Bach, Brahms, Mozart and their contemporaries, the Consort frequently premieres American works written especially for them. This extraordinary ensemble offers superb musicianship, exciting performances and unusual programming.

The members of the Consort are graduates of leading conservatories or

universities and have studied with world-renowned artists. All of the musicians perform individually as soloists and members of symphony and chamber orchestras, often at Carnegie Recital Hall, the Kennedy Center and many other halls across the United States.

Alumnus to Present Cogan Lecture

Northeast alumnus Thomas Songster, director of sports and recreation for the Joseph P. Kennedy Jr. Foundation and for Special Olympics Inc., will present the Third Annual Max Cogan Lecture at 8 p.m., March 5, in the SUB Alumni Room. Songster will speak on "The Importance of the Future, and Building on the Experiences of the Past." His presentation is free and open to the public.

Songster received his master's degree from Northeast in 1963. He holds a bachelor's from Doane College and earned his doctorate from the University

of Utah. In 1990, he received the R. Tait McKenzie Award, one of five major honors bestowed by the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

The Max Cogan Lecture Series, which focuses on the integration of physical education and the social sciences, was established to honor the late Max Cogan, professor of physical education at Northeast from 1966-1988.

Funded through donations to the NMSU Development Fund, the lecture series brings recognized scholars from either physical education or the social sciences area to the University.

Basic eligibility includes U.S. citizenship and a doctorate or comparable professional qualifications. College teaching experience is expected for lecturing awards. Most lecturing assignments are in English, though some may require another language.

Poggi To Coach In Denmark

Soccer Coach Dave Poggi has been selected to participate in a coaching exchange sponsored by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America in conjunction with the Danish Soccer Association. Poggi will leave for the three-week program held in Copenhagen, Denmark, March 1.

While in Denmark, Poggi will study and observe the training techniques and preparation at the professional and youth level. A Danish coach will visit Northeast in August and September.

"Denmark is recognized as one of the

world's powers in regards to soccer. Their training methods and styles are as different as their culture," Poggi said.

Poggi has been the head soccer coach at Northeast for six years. This year, the soccer team was invited to the Division II national tournament in Rochester, Mich. The team was ranked in the top 10 nationally for the majority of the season.

Poggi received his bachelor's degree in psychology/sociology and his master's in sport psychology administration, both from the University of Oregon.
