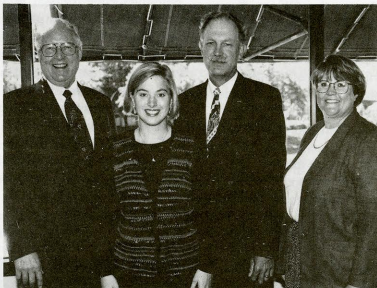

Lyceum Series speaker to explore Harry Truman -- the Man and the Myth

Benedict Zobrist, retired director of the Harry S. Truman Library in Independence, Mo., will speak on campus as part of the Lyceum Series on Oct. 9. Zobrist will speak on "Harry S. Truman -- The Man and the Myth" at 7:30 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium.

During his long tenure heading the Presidential Library and Museum, Zobrist knew and worked with President Truman and coordinated the state funeral of the president. Zobrist played a major role in opening the most significant papers of President Truman and the hundreds of his personal letters to Mrs. Truman. Among other major additions to the Library's holdings were the papers of Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

Zobrist also supervised the major building addition to the Library. Serving also as executive secretary of the private, non-profit Harry S. Truman Library Institute, he

organized numerous national conferences and oversaw the granting of fellowships to hundreds of scholars. He is most proud of instituting "Truman Week" -- a week-long annual celebration held around Truman's birthday.

A native of Illinois, Zobrist completed his doctorate at Northwestern University and has engaged in postdoctoral study at several leading American as well as overseas universities. Formerly associated with the Manuscripts Division of the Library of Congress, the Newberry Library of Chicago and the Department of the Army, he came to the Truman Library in 1969.

Among his many honors, he was named 1994 World Citizen of the Year by the Kansas City United Nations Day Committee.

Free tickets for Zobrist's presentation will be available Oct. 2 in the SAB Office, SUB, for students, faculty and staff. ☛

Historic register workshop

A workshop on how to research houses and historic districts for the National Historic Register will be conducted on Oct. 7 from 1 to 3 p.m. in the SUB Conference Room. Steve Mitchell of the State Historic Preservation Office will conduct the workshop.

Buildings and districts can qualify for the National Historic Register on historic significance, which includes not only association with prominent individuals or famous events, but also association with the history of a particular group or with important historic trends and developments.

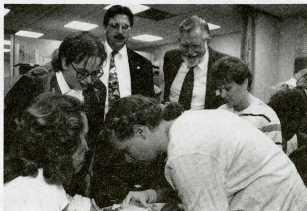
Delegation visits Division of Human Potential and Performance

Author donates local history book

Ellen Davison recently presented the first copy of her book, *Community at Large*, to President Jack Magruder.

Davison said she provided the University with the first copy because of the assistance she received while working on the book. "If I hadn't been able to come here on campus and to the library, it would have been very difficult for me to finalize the book and put it together," she said.

As a part of the Special Collections section in Pickler Memorial Library, *Community at Large* takes a look at the history of Scotland County, in particular, Lawn Ridge, the small town where Davison lived as a child.

Describing the book as a "labor of love" and a "community service," Davison said the book has been a project she had worked on for about 30 years.

Russian pianist to perform recital

Guzal Abdullina, professor of piano at the Kazan State Conservatory in the Republic of Tatarstan, Russia, will perform in concert Oct. 1 at 3 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium. The concert will feature works by Chopin, Schubert, Borodin, Yakhin and Scriabin, and is free and open to the public.

A recipient of the distinguished People's Artist Award, Abdullina has been performing since 1962 throughout Russia and other countries of the former Soviet bloc. More recently, she has also performed in France, Finland, Germany and Switzerland.

Abdullina is an honors graduate of the Moscow State Conservatory, where she won several piano competitions. At the Kazan State Conservatory, she heads the advanced piano, orchestration and chamber music departments.

In addition to her strong interest in teaching and research, she is the author of a piano method publication. Abdullina is in the United States during the 1995-96 academic year as a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence at Clarion University of Pennsylvania. ☛

The Iliad to be performed

The acclaimed British theatre company, Aquila Productions, will present a staged version of Homer's epic poem, *The Iliad* on Sept. 25 at 7:30 p.m. in the SUB Down Under. The production is free, but seating is limited.

Aquila Productions has been given special permission to stage the acclaimed Robert Fagles translation of *The Iliad*. This English translation by the Princeton Classicist won the 1991 Landon Translation award from the Society of American Poets and has been called "the standard

translation for a new generation and an astonishing performance."

The New Yorker called Aquila's work "The single best production of a Greek drama we've seen anywhere." The production aims to present Homer as a live performance, not as a written work.

Aquila will present book one of this giant of Western literature in a bold and magical event that promises to hold its audience spellbound with masks, movement and evocative live music. ☛
