REGISTRATION FOR EVENING CLASSES will begin at 7 p.m. today and continue nightly through Monday, Sept. 10. The first session of evening classes will also meet today.

SAFETY AND SECURITY will be writing tickets for all violations except for failure to register vehicles. Tickets for vehicles not having current NMSU stickers will be written after Saturday. No parking is allowed on the inside lane of the circle drive outside of the Administration/Humanities Building. Also, no parking is permitted north of Missouri Hall on Normal Street and in crosswalks or driveways, across sidewalks, or blocking dumpsters. One row only of parking is allowed east of Dobson Hall along the wall. Unless cooperation is gained, a towing policy will be started.

The Kirksville City Ordinance requires that the public using the city streets and living within the confines of Kirksville, including the NMSU campus, for any 28 day period, must purchase a Kirksville city sticker unless they have a valid sticker from their hometown.

Robert Cowan, Social Science, has been informed that his manuscript, "Effect of Instructions to Learn and Repeated Semantic Processing on Long-Term Free Recall," has been accepted for publication in The American Journal of Psychology.

A science fiction exhibit by Heinz Woehlk, Language and Literature, is on display in Pickler Memorial Library display cases through Monday, Sept. 10.

Gene C. Wunder, Business, had his biographical sketch included in the 21st edition of Who's Who in Finance and Industry, published in Aug. 1979.

Jim Barnes, Language and Literature, editor of The Chariton Review, an international literary journal, is one of three editors of literary magazines nationwide to receive honorable mention in the Coordinating Council of Literary Magazines \$5,000 Editor's Fellowships. There were 10 fellowships granted this year. The Missouri Arts Council also awarded the Review \$1,800 in matching funds for continuing publication. The National Endowment for the Arts awarded \$1,400 in matching funds to the magazine for a special supplementary issue translating Zuegnis Und Zeichen, by West German poet Dagmar Nick. Barnes is scheduled to have a volume of poetry, "The Fish on Poteau Mountain," published in the spring. He has also recently had single poems accepted for publication by Denver Quarterly, Poetry Now, and New Letters.
