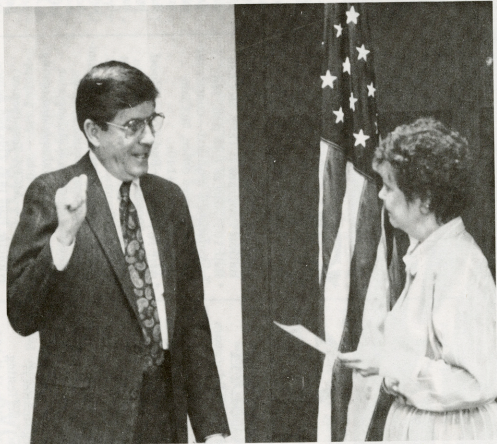

## North Sworn In

**W**illiam North is sworn in as the newest member of the Northeast Missouri State University Board of Governors by Kim Abrens, secretary. North's appointment is one of two non-Missourian positions that were added to the expanded Board of Governors when the University's mission was changed from a regional institution to Missouri's public liberal arts and sciences university in 1986.

North and the second national representative (who remains to be named) will serve the Board as non-voting members offering a nationwide perspective to Board issues.

North, a native of Wyaconda, Mo., is a trial lawyer and director and shareholder of Shugbart, Thomson and Kilroy in the Kansas City area. North is a 1953 graduate of Northeast.



## J. Robert Cox speaks on environmental issues

**O**n Oct. 30 and 31, the Division of Language and Literature is sponsoring a series of two public lectures by Dr. J. Robert Cox from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Cox will speak on the topic of environmental advocacy at 8 p.m., Oct. 30, in Baldwin Hall Little Theater. The title of his talk is "Finding a 'Green' Voice: Changing Roles of Activists in the Global Environmental Movement." His second talk will be at 3:30 p.m., Oct. 31, in the Student Union Building Alumni Room. The topic is "Memory's Difference: The Emerging Critical Rhetoric of Postmodernity." A public reception, sponsored by Lambda Pi Eta, the national speech communication honorary fraternity, will immediately follow. In addition to his work as profes-

sor of rhetoric and argumentation, Cox has been very active in the environmental movement. A past president of the North Carolina Sierra Club, Cox was instrumental in persuading the U.S. Congress to pass legislation tripling the size of protected "wilderness" lands in North Carolina. For the past three years, he has served as the chair of the national Sierra Club's public affairs committee advising on communication strategies for national campaigns. He is currently a member of the Sierra Club's International Committee. He has consulted environmental groups in Nepal and Malaysia, and recently was called upon by the U.S. State Department to brief the minister for the environment from Hungary on the role of environmental activism in political democracies.

Cox is a nationally recognized rhetorical theorist, with three books and dozens of articles to his credit. He was awarded the "Best Monograph" research citation in 1982 by the American Forensic Association, and in 1987 Cox was named Van Zelst Professor of Communication Studies at Northwestern University, an honorary visiting professor appointment. During his brief stay at Northwestern, he was named by the Associated Student Government as "one of the best professors at N.U." In his work on the environmental issues, Cox has combined theory and practice, applying his theoretical and critical skills in the political arena. Most recently, Cox helped to found *Ecologue: Newsletter for Environmental Advocacy*.
