Registration Brings JINS Premiere

Three Junior Interdisciplinary Seminars, "signature courses" of the Liberal Studies Program, premiere in the summer and fall sessions.

David Nichols, professor of music, focuses on the **intersections of music, history, and religious thought and practice, JINS 301**. Nichols was a member of the Liberal Arts and Sciences Task Force which generated the report that spurred curricular reform by the Undergraduate Council and Faculty Senate. Nichols mulled over the importance of interdisciplinary teaching and learning and the design of writing-enhanced coursework for several years before faculty started the process of designing courses to meet the interdisciplinary learning outcomes generated as part of the curricular changes.

James Padfield, assistant professor of health and exercise science, offers **JINS 302: "Wilderness Leadership"** in the second block of summer session. Padfield will combine principles of leadership defined by multiple disciplines with "Wilderness Physiology." Concepts will be applied practically in a section of the seminar titled "Wilderness Serendipity" survival in alpine, desert, winter and marine environments, orienteering, search and rescue techniques and the Challenge.

A team of faculty—Martha Edwards, assistant professor of history; Sara Orel, assistant professor of art; and Cole Woodcox, associate professor of English—designed and will teach **JINS 300: "Cultural Crossroads"** with its focus on Istanbul during the fall semester. This seminar is described as a "template" course. Although the faculty team will investigate with their students the history, culture, literature, architecture, art and artifacts of a city where over centuries many cultures have met and still meet and co-exist, they don't "own" the course. They deliberately provide a course design and an opportunity for other faculty, teaching together, to explore other cultural crossroads be they the Mississippi basin, Mexico City, or Singapore.

Edwards is a classicist and historian. In

addition to her involvement in this seminar, she has designed a second JINS on the history of "disabilities." Orel is an Egyptologist and art historian. Woodcox teaches composition and British literature from the Romantics forward. During his sabbatical, he's pursuing a master's degree from the Courtauld Institute. To develop the course and to prepare to teach collaboratively, the team taught each other course materials from their disciplinary perspectives and traveled to Istanbul over the December 1997 interim. They return to Istanbul in December 1999, and have organized a study abroad opportunity for class members interested in traveling to the cultural crossroads encountered through their studies.

The Junior Interdisciplinary Seminar was proposed and ratified by faculty as a direct response to assessment data about the interdisciplinary thinking skills demonstrated in the Liberal Arts and Sciences Portfolios submitted by graduating seniors. Although each year, some students submitted course materials that evidenced strong interdisciplinary thinking and integrative learning, many students indicated that they were not aware of being challenged to or having chosen to make connections among the disciplinary perspectives, epistemologies, and knowledge bases they encountered. The seminar was proposed as a junior year requirement both to serve as a kind of capstone of the Liberal Studies Program of basic skills and modes of inquiry and to encourage interdisciplinarity as students pursue depth in their majors. Each seminar is designed as a writing enhanced, interdisciplinary course.

Most students who matriculated in fall 1998 won't enroll in a Junior Interdisciplinary Seminar until the 2000 academic year. Some students who are using the 1998-99 General Bulletin will be eligible for either summer or fall seminars once they satisfy the Sophomore Writing Experience. They have first priority for enrolling. Other students with junior status who have completed the Sophomore Writing Experience might elect the course.

"Blacks in the Media: Accurate Representation or Distorted Images," (10:30-11:50 a.m.) will be facilitated by Cassandra Howze, assistant news director at Florida A&M University.

"Female Rappers as Defined by Black Womanist Theory" (1:30-2:50 p.m.) will be facilitated by Shannon Campbell, assistant professor at the University of Florida.

Truman alumnus Darwin Harris will team up with fellow actor Leonard Roberts to co-facilitate Session IV, Blacks in Film and Television: "Acting Out, 90's Style" (3:40-5 p.m.). The symposium wrap-up session will be from 4:30 to 5 p.m.

State Ballet of Missouri to Perform With Truman's Cantoria

The State Ballet of Missouri will have company when the troupe performs on the Truman stage March 23. The State Ballet's 1998-99 season marks the addition of several new ballets into the repertoire. One of the most significant additions will be featured at Truman - a new ballet set to Francis Poulenc's *Gloria*. Choreographed by Lila York, this collaborative venture will include live accompaniment compliments of Truman State University's select chorus Cantoria. The performance begins at 7:30 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium.

The permanent home of the State Ballet of Missouri is Kansas City, where it annually presents three repertory seasons and The Nutcracker at the historic downtown Midland Theater. Eight members of the company, composed of 21 dancers and 3 school apprentices, are Missouri natives. Performances made by the group are characterized by vigorous dance styles, naturalness of movement, theatricality and a sense of humor. The State Ballet of Missouri has a repertoire of more than 50 ballets representing the diverse dance styles and great works of the 20th century. The troupe will perform two additional ballets selected from this repertoire in addition to the presentation of *Gloria*.

Artistic Director William Whitener, a dancer, teacher and choreographer. Whitener has been a member of several prominent companies including the New York City Opera Ballet, the Joffrey Ballet and the Twyla Tharp Dance Company.
