Five Members Added to Truman's Foundation Board of Directors

Five members were recently added to the Truman State University Foundation Board. Each of the five will serve a three-year term which began Jan. 1. The Foundation Board of Directors provides leadership for Truman's efforts to attract private gifts and ensure good stewardship of these resources. The additions are part of a transition plan recently approved by the Board that will add up to a total of 15 new Foundation Board members in 1998. Currently, the Foundation Board is comprised of voting and out-of-state members of the Board of Governors and the University President.

Walker W. Allen ('39, business education) of Columbia, Mo., is retired. He served in the military from 1942-46. He then worked at Fisher Governor Co., in Marshalltown, Iowa. In 1969 he began working for the University of Missouri Medical Center in Columbia, Mo. He worked there as assistant director and chief financial officer until April 1973 when he became associate director of the Medical Center. He retired in 1988. Allen and his wife, Doris, have two children, Pinney Lee Allen and William D. Allen.

Doris (Pickens) Bohon ('43, business education) is a Kirksville resident. She served on the Greenwood Elementary School PTA, is a Girl Scout leader and the Becky Thatcher Girl Scout Council President. Bohon is very active in the Presbyterian church where she serves as an elder deacon, a Sunday school teacher and a church officer. In 1982, she received the Kirksville Area Chamber of Commerce "Citizen of the Year" Award.

Charles M. Foudree ('66, accounting) serves as executive vice president of Harmon Industries. Prior to this, he was employed by Peat Marwick for six years. He was recently appointed to the Truman Library Institute Board of Directors. In 1995 Foudree served as Truman's Business Division's Executive-in-Residence. He and his wife, Colleen, reside in Lee's Summit, Mo., and have two children, Melanie and Charles Mark.

Larry A. Lunsford ('81, accounting) of Overland Park, Kan., serves as the vice president of finance for Bernstein-Rein Advertising, Inc., in Kansas City, Mo. Skelton Performs Piano Recital

Skelton's performances and compositions have been featured on many public radio and television stations including National Public Radio's "Audiophile Audition" and "Performance Today." He has recorded four compact discs for Centaur and Albany Records. Skelton holds degrees from Loyola University, Eastman and the Manhattan schools of music. The public is invited to attend this free performance which will be followed by a master class featuring Piano Festival participants.

Truman's Radio Station Hits the Airwaves At 88.7FM

Truman's student-run radio station hit the air waves Feb. 10 adding a new alternative to the FM dial. KTRM is broadcast on 88.7 FM. The college station calls itself "The Edge" and follows an alternative music format. KTRM is a full-service radio station providing information on campus news, events and sports while featuring music genres not played by any other station in the area. Music is broadcast everyday from 2 p.m. to midnight.

KTRM has been broadcasting over cable radio at 102.1 FMca. It was and will still be available on television Channel 2 for students on campus and on television Channel 36 for anyone living off campus. The Edge hopes to attract students and the Kirksville community.

The disc jockeys are students who play alternative songs from a variety of artists. In addition to the college alternative format there are also specialty shows. The specialty shows feature music unique to the format of other radio stations in the area like jazz, classical, hip-hop and disco.

The first specialty show of the week is an hour of sports talk on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. Listeners are encouraged to call in and share their opinions. From 8 to 9 p.m. on Tuesdays there is a Ska show. On

Thursdays, Kevin Berset hosts a Grateful Dead show from 9 p.m. to midnight. There is the KTRM Happy Hour on Fridays from 4 to 6 p.m. This show features funny new clips, jokes and commentary in addition to alternative music. The World Show with Sarah Shmigelsky on Friday 6-9 p.m. features a variety of international music.

The weekends are full of more specialty shows starting with music from the 1980s with Big Daddy J's at 2 p.m. Saturday. Jeff Bernth's disco show is aired Saturday at 4 p.m. This show is followed by Joe Klug's RPM at 6 p.m. His show includes industrial and techno music. Belile's Metal show on Saturday from 8 p.m. to midnight features heavy metal music. Sunday features classical music from 2 to 4 p.m., jazz from 4 to 6 p.m., blues from 6 to 8 p.m., R&B from 8 to 10 p.m. and Mike Novak's White Afro Funk Banquet featuring hip-hop, rap and funk from 10 p.m. to midnight. KTRM will also broadcast campus sporting events live when possible.

KTRM Kirksville is a non-commercial, non-educational station. It serves Truman State University and Adair County. KTRM provides a request line at 785.5638 and a fax line at 785.7601.

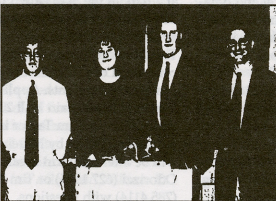
