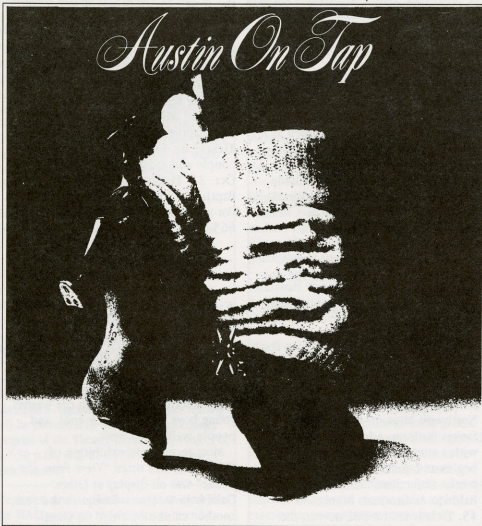

LYCEUM SERIES PRESENTS

Austin On Tap



The Northeast Missouri State University Lyceum Series presents the debut performance of Austin on Tap Dance Theatre in Baldwin Auditorium at 8 p.m., Oct. 29. Tickets will be available at the Business Office McClain Hall 105, the Edna Campbell Book Store and at the door.

This is a Mid-America Arts Alliance program. Mid-America is a non-profit regional arts organization whose partners include the state arts agencies of Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas, the National

Endowment for the Arts and private contributors. The use of cameras and recording devices during the program is strictly prohibited.

Founded in 1982 by executive director and choreographer Debra Bray, Austin on Tap has evolved into a dedicated, professional troupe of six full-time dancers who have won rave reviews of audiences and critics from Washington, D.C., to Honolulu, Hawaii. In addition to Bray, the rest of the troupe includes Stephanie Dannelley, Leesa Speck, Donna Winters and Marcy Yargas.

Bray received her bachelor's and master's degrees from West Texas State University, where she taught and choreographed numerous musicals. Dannelley began dance lessons at age 5, and gymnastics at age 10. She studied dance at Southwest Texas State University and held a position on a nationally ranked gymnastic team. Speck has studied tap, ballet, jazz and acrobatics. Also a graduate of Southwest Texas State, Speck owned and operated her own dance studio before joining Austin on Tap. Winters began studying dance at six years of age. She was a member of Fort Wayne Jazz and Tap Company and has made several television commercials. Yargas graduated from the Houston School for the Visual & Performing Arts and began her professional career as a member of the Delia Stewart Jazz Company.

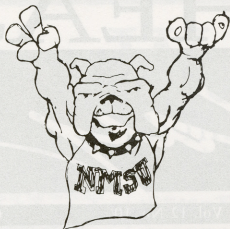
Austin on Tap tours the nation an average of eight months out of every year, spreading the word that tap dancing is alive and well. Although traditional tap techniques are a large part of any Austin on Tap performance, audiences across the country have discovered that the troupe's dancers are as apt to take the stage wearing cowboy boots as they are wearing tap shoes.

Calvert exhibition on campus

The Afro-American works of St. Louis artist Kenneth Calvert will be exhibited in the Art Gallery of Ophelia Parrish from Oct. 27 through Nov. 7. A reception honoring Calvert will be held at 8 p.m., Oct. 30, in the Art Gallery.

Calvert's work exhibits an enriched and diversified background in the visual arts with expertise as an illustrator, painter, muralist and sculptor. Calvert's art has been compared to Norman Rockwell on several occasions. His paintings depict the American

dream as presented by Rockwell, by covering much the same values while placing the scenes in different locations. Calvert's compositions typically includes scenes which represent an ideal America, kids holding car washes, young boys trying to look cool, and people walking to work.

Most recently an exhibition of Calvert's works titled "View From the Inside" was on display at Lithos' Gallery in St. Louis. Earlier in the year, another exhibition titled "A Visual Experience in Black" was shown on the campus of Illinois State University in Bloomington, Ill.

When asked to describe his style Calvert replied, "I'm a people painter. Regardless of what style I'm working in, I usually deal with human images. I use a lot of color distortions in my paintings. I'm more interested in the overall impact of my composition."
