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German Club Establishes Scholarship

The German Club is offering scholarships to students who plan to study in Austria, Germany or German-speaking Switzerland for an academic year, semester or summer.

Students from all academic fields may apply; however, the program of study abroad must be conducted primarily or entirely in German.

To be eligible for the award, applicants must be full-time freshmen, sophomores or juniors and be accepted for study in a fully-accredited academic program in a German-speaking country. If applicants have not yet been notified of final acceptance by the scholarship deadline, they may be awarded the scholarship pending notification.

"I think the scholarship is a novel idea that is much needed at NMSU to encourage study abroad. It is important for students to be involved in different environments because it creates enthusiasm and interest in the study of foreign languages and cultures. This can be helpful in improving international relations," Connie Reid, faculty adviser, said.

Materials for the scholarships must be submitted to Reid, including a current academic transcript; three letters of recommendation, including one from a German language instructor; a publication issued by the sponsoring institution containing information about the study-abroad program; and a copy of the official notification of acceptance into the program.

The German Club Scholarship Committee, comprised of club officers and the faculty adviser, will review each application.

To raise funds for the scholarship, the German Club sold Advent calendars last fall and plans to continue this project in the future.

"Both the members and I appreciate the community's response to the calendar sales," Reid said. "We feel it is a good fundraiser because it helps promote one of the purposes of our club, which is understanding more about German culture."

Reid also said that any alumni who studied abroad or anyone interested in developing better foreign relations may contribute to the scholarship fund.
