Cornell to Deliver Address at Nursing Recognition Ceremony

Gretchen R. Cornell, professor emeritus of nursing, will deliver the address "The Ivory Tower, A Fable For Our Times" at the Nursing Recognition Ceremony at Truman. The pre-commencement ceremony will begin at 7 p.m., May 16, in Baldwin Auditorium.



The Nursing Recognition Ceremony for the Class of 2003 is a traditional program recognizing seniors' successful completion of a rigorous academic and professional program. The seniors receive recognition for scholarly and service accomplishments and their professional nursing pins. The Bachelor of Science in Nursing signifies eligibility to participate in National Council Licensure Examination for registered nurses.

Cornell has several academic degrees, including a Bachelor of Science (General Science) and a Diploma in Nursing from Fort Hays State University; a Master of Science in Nursing from the University of Illinois in Chicago; Education Specialist

(EdS) from Truman State University; and a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri. She retired from Truman after 28 years as a faculty member in the Nursing Program, teaching courses related to nursing care of the older adult, chronic illness, and death and dying. She is currently employed as an associate professor at Brigham Young University.

Cornell is co-investigator in a quantitative study of professional values of baccalaureate nursing students and faculty; co-investigator in a qualitative study of widower grief and the perceptions of adult children; and a co-investigator in a qualitative study of caregiver role strain. She is a Team Leader for on-site evaluation for the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education to accredit professional nursing education programs.

A reception will follow in the Student Union Building Activities Room. Both activities are free and open to the public.
