THE SCHWENDEL-LINCOLN COLLECTION DEDICATION CEREMONIES begin with the Lincoln Contests at 7 p.m. Saturday in the Alumni Room of the Student Union Building. On Sunday, Fred Schwengel, a 1930 graduate and president of the United States Capitol Historical Society, will donate a collection of Lincoln literature, artwork and memorabilia to NMSU at 3 p.m. in the Special Collection Room of Pickler Memorial Library. His wife, Ethel, a 1932 graduate, will attend to present the collection. Also on Sunday, a State of the Union Address/Dinner featuring guest speaker Thomas B. Curtis, former U.S. Congressman, is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. The ceremonies will conclude with a History Symposium at 7 p.m. Monday, May 1, in Baldwin Auditorium.

"AN EVENING OF TWENTIETH CENTURY MUSIC" will be presented at 8 tonight in Baldwin Auditorium. Bela Bartok's "Sonata for Two Pianos and Percussion" will be performed by Janice Saffir, University instructor in piano, and Paul Stephens, piano teacher in the Preparatory Music Program. Graduate Assistants Deborah Nelson and Kevin Laird will play percussion. Saffir and Stephens will also play sonatas for two pianos by Francis Poulenc and Igor Stravinsky. The Percussion Ensemble, directed by Laird, will present John Cage's "Amores" with Stephens on piano. Nelson and two University seniors, Ted Dodson and Randel Larson, are members of the Percussion Ensemble. Everyone is invited to attend.
