## Northeast's 125th: Charles J. McClain



Charles J. McClain

He earned his Master of Education in 1957 and

Serving as Northeast Missouri State University's 10th president, Charles J. McClain's tenure lasted from 1970-1989.

Born in Iron County Mo., in 1931 McClain received a bachelor's degree in history from Southwest Missouri State College at Springfield in 1954

Doctor of Education in 1961 both from the University of Missouri-Columbia.

Before being selected as Northeast's president, McClain founded Jefferson College in Hillsboro, where he served as president for seven years. He also served as assistant dean of MU's College of Education for two years, assistant dean at the University of Missouri-Columbia College of Education, and administrative assistant at the University of Missouri-Columbia Laboratory School. During the course of his more than 40 years as an educator, he has also served in the capacity of assistant professor, school superintendent, elementary school principal and elementary teacher.

McClain's tenure as president of Northeast was marked with outstanding examples of "Innovation in Education." He led NMSU to national prominence for its academic excellence and assessment programs. McClain's Value-Added program tested

students throughout undergraduate studies to track strengths and weaknesses. In 1983 under his leadership, NMSU received the G. Theodore Mitau Award for Innovation and Change in Higher Education, the highest award from the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. In 1985, Gov. John Ashcroft signed a bill designating Northeast as the statewide public liberal arts and sciences university for Missouri. McClain called this his greatest achievement at Northeast.

During McClain's term, Ashcroft said he received inquiries from western Europe and from virtually every state in the United States about the programs McClain developed at Northeast Missouri State University.

In 1989 McClain was selected by the Coordinating Board for Higher Education as Missouri's new commissioner of higher education.

## Student Senate Constitution

### Changes from current to proposed Constitution

On April 12 the Student Senate passed a new constitution which now will go before the Student Association for its approval on April 24. Several changes have been proposed by the Senate to make the new constitution more applicable to the functions of NMSU's Student Senate: the body more representative of the Student Association, and the role of the Senate in the University more thoroughly defined. The major changes are detailed below. A copy of the proposed constitution will be available at the Student Senate Information Desk.

#### Mission

The first major change is in Article II. The present constitution contains a general purpose statement. The proposed constitution contains a much-expanded Mission Statement which includes the three-fold function of Student Senate: representing the views of students in University policy-making; facilitating communication between students, faculty staff and administration, and preparing for the future of NMSU and its students.

#### Membership

Other changes are difficult to limit to one article because they affect the entire document. One of these changes is the councilperson-at-large. In the new constitution the office of councilperson-at-large has been removed and replaced with a new standing committee: External Affairs. The person elected councilperson-at-large this spring would then become External Affairs committee chair upon passage of the new constitution.

The new constitution adds two representatives-at-large to the voting membership. This is really a gain of one voting member because of the loss of the councilperson-at-large. This addition increases the number of representatives-at-large to 10. Because of the ungainly number and to allow more students the opportunity to run, five of these positions will be elected in the spring elections and five in the fall elections, starting in spring 1993.

All members elected in the spring other than the president currently have to wait until the fall to be officially sworn in. In the new constitution, the transition will take place in the spring so as to allow the new senators to begin working on projects and policies over the summer.

Freshman representatives have been renamed incoming student representatives. This is to allow any undergraduate student new to the University to run for an incoming student representative position. The

present constitution defines freshmen by the official hour listing of the University.

The student representative to the Board of Governors and the Student Senate parliamentarian are currently non-voting members of the Student Senate. They will remain so in the new constitution unless the student holding the position also holds one of the voting member positions.

#### Requirements

The cumulative GPA requirement for all Student Senate members in the new constitution has been changed to 2.2. In the present constitution, executive officers must maintain a 2.5 while the remaining members must maintain a 2.2.

All in the new constitution is the clause that all Student Senate members must be full-time students.

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## International House To Begin This Fall

An International House will be formed in Missouri South Residential College in the fall 1992 semester.

All students who are interested in a co-ed international living-learning environment are invited to an informational meeting at 7 p.m. on April 23 in the Missouri Colleges Conference Room. This meeting is open to both students who have already renewed their housing and students whose housing plans for next semester are uncertain.

Joyce Hearn, professor of Missouri South College

said, "Mo South has had an international theme since 1988 and we have dreamed of having an actual International House for three years. I am delighted we are able to implement it at this time."

"I encourage all NMSU students who want a richly textured living-learning experience with students from other lands to come learn about this program.

### Administrative Committee

The executive committee in the new constitution has been renamed the Administrative Committee. This committee will be composed of the officers and the committee chairs, rather than the former executive committee membership of the officers only. Each officer was explained '92 and given a more detailed job description.

The major change was, as stated before, the removal of the councilperson-at-large. The role of the councilperson-at-large is currently to run elections, administer the associate program, and coordinate external relations. The running of elections will be a function of the Public Relations Committee, the Associate Program will be under the vice president, and external relations will be handled by the External Affairs Committee.

### Standing Committees

Two new standing committees were added to the new constitution: Campus Environment and External Affairs. The Campus Environment committee will have the charge of providing student input into the decisions that determine the physical appearance of our campus. This includes construction, planning and recycling, among other things.

One standing committee was removed from the constitution: Special Events. The Special Events committee is a programming committee, and many of its functions overlap with other campus organizations and offices like SAB, residential living, and the CAOC office.
