Opportunities for NSF Fellowships, Teaching Scholarships Announced

Applications for the 2001-2002 competition for the National Science Foundation (NSF) Graduate Research Fellowship Program are now available. The NSF will award approximately 900 new graduate research fellowships to support graduate study in science, mathematics and engineering. The deadline for applying in the 2001 competition is Nov. 7, 2000. For more information call 865.241.4513.

Two scholarship opportunities have also been announced.

The Missouri's Teacher Education Scholarship Program is a one-time, non-renewable award of \$2,000 to be used in one academic year. An average of 200 scholarships are awarded each year. The qualifications for this scholarship include the following: students must be residents

of Missouri with freshman or sophomore status or a returning adult (with no more than 60 hours) and must have scored in the top 15 percent on the ACT or SAT. Applications must be received by February 15, 2001. Winners will be notified in April.

The Missouri's Minority Teaching Scholarship is a \$3,000 per year renewable award offered to encourage talented minority students to pursue a career in teaching. Eligible applicants must be residents in Missouri of African American, Asian American, Hispanic American or Native American descent; college students or returning adults with no more than 60 hours; and must be enrolled in a participating, approved teacher education program. Applications must be postmarked by February 15, 2001.

Shakespeare Express will Perform

The Shenandoah Shakespeare Express, an eleven-person acting company, will perform *Twelfth Night* at 8 p.m., Sept. 26, in Baldwin Hall Auditorium. The performance, sponsored by the Division of Language and Literature, is free and no tickets are required.

Based in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, the globe-trotting Express believes that Shakespeare's plays work best when performed under the conditions for which they were originally designed. Thus, all of the company's performances take approximately two hours, are performed on a bare stage with the house lights up and no intermission. The show features consider-

able interaction between players and audience. The SSE's goal is "to strip away 400 years of accumulated theatrical apparatus from Shakespearean productions, and restore the original dynamic built into the language of Shakespeare's plays."

In the twelve years since its inception in 1988, the SSE has played in 38 states and five countries, including visits to the Edinburgh International Fringe Festival in Scotland and the Folger Shakespeare Library's Elizabethan Theatre in Washington D.C. In addition, the troupe has performed at hundreds of high schools, colleges and universities across North America.

Tenth Annual Lecture Scheduled

Dr. Robert Schnucker will be delivering the 10th annual Early-Vreeland Lecture at 7 p.m., Oct. 5, in the SUB Governors' Room. Schnucker, professor emeritus of history at Truman, will speak on "A Life of Learning."

Schnucker began his tenure at Truman in 1963 and retired in 1996 after 33 years of service to the University. His emphasis included history, philosophy and religion classes. He taught World Civilization and Asian Religions nearly every semester.

He also oversaw the creation of Thomas

Jefferson University Press, which is now the Truman State University Press.

The Early-Vreeland Lecture was established by Joseph Vreeland through the Truman State University Foundation in memory of his wife, who died at age 40. A 1973 Truman graduate, Barbara Early-Vreeland graduated magna cum laude with bachelor's degrees in history and French.

Tom Bultman, associate professor of biology, presented his paper, "Mediation of Multitrophic Interactions by Fungal Endophytes" at the Netherlands Institute of Terrestrial Ecology in Heteren, Holland. Bultman also presented "Mediation of Induced Resistance by Fungal Endophytes" at the Max Planck Institute for Chemical Ecology in Jena, Germany.

Jesús Illundáin-Agurruza, assistant professor of philosophy, presented his paper "The Nazi Superman Meet Frankenstein: A Philosophical and Literary Critique of the Fascist Body" at the 28th annual meeting of the International Association for the Philosophy of Sport in Melbourne, Australia, on Sept. 3.

Gregory Jones, associate professor of music, has been selected to the Fulbright review panel which will select Fulbright recipients for the coming year. Jones will travel to Washington D.C. in October where he will join faculty from universities across America in reviewing applicants.

Students Encouraged to Register to Vote

Only 54 percent of eligible Americans voted in the 1996 presidential election, and this was considered by many as a good turnout.
