GTRA Positions Available in Education

The Division of Education is now accepting applications for graduate teaching and research assistantships. The assistantship program pays a cash stipend of \$4,000 per semester or \$8,000 per academic year plus the recipient's tuition is waived up to nine hours per academic semester. All books, supplies and special course fees are the responsibility of the recipient. The candidate must file as a degree-seeking graduate student with the Graduate Office before the assistantship application can be considered. Only students

fully admitted to the MAE program are eligible for GTRA Awards, which may be for one semester or for one full year depending on the Division's needs and the MAE student's internship plans.

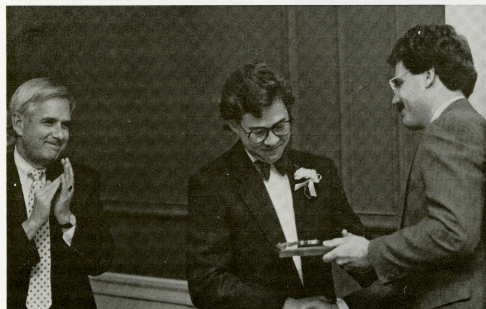
Hollywood Teleconference to be Held

Minority Services and Omega Psi Phi fraternity will sponsor a teleconference May 3 at 6 p.m. in Violette Hall 121. The teleconference is titled "African Americans Working in Hollywood." The event will touch on some of the major issues surrounding today's Black Hollywood. Although the highly visible success of stars like Bill Cosby, Oprah Winfrey and Spike Lee is exciting, few people of color hold behind the scenes decision-making positions, and new opportunities for minority involvement are rare.

In this live, interactive telecommunication event featuring Wesley Snipes and Mario Van Peebles, stars of *New Jack City*, some of

the myths and realities of African Americans working in the motion picture/television industry will be explored. Panelists will define where African Americans are and where they are going as a major ethnic group operating within the industry. Participants include Snipes, Van Peebles, Ruby Dee, star of *Do the Right Thing*, and Marla Gibbs, star of *227* and *The Jeffersons*. A current listing of job opportunities in the motion picture and television industry will be announced during the teleconference.

NOTABLES

The Alpha Tau Omega social fraternity received a \$1,000 cash award from the Alpha Tau Omega Alumni Foundation of Province 18 in Kansas City, Mo. The award is given for academic excellence and achievement. An additional amount of \$800 was awarded to 11 members. The amounts ranged from \$50-\$140 and were received by Jim Baker, Jamie Barger, Andy Berry, Truth Grampp, Darren Millam, Christian Mullgardt, Scott Peters, Gary Ruisinger, Darren Watt and Tom Wright. These awards were based on GPA, with a minimum of 3.2 needed to be eligible.

Paula Cochran, assistant professor of communication disorders, and Glen Bull, University of Virginia, co-authored the article "Learnerbased Tools" appearing in the April 1991 issue of *The Computing Teacher*, a journal of the International Society for Technology in Education.

Marlow Ediger, professor of education, has been appointed by the University of Kalyani, West Bengal, India, as an evaluator and assessor of doctorate theses in education. He spoke at the Minnesota Council Teachers of English on the "Whole Language Philosophy of Instruction."

Lewis Hershey, assistant professor of business administration, has signed with WCB publishers to write a teaching supplement for their Public Relations text by Baskin and Arnoff. The supplement is specifically designed to integrate the teaching of public relations into the overall marketing strategy of organizations to reflect trends in commercial

practice. Hershey also signed with Allyn and Bacon publishers to author the teaching supplement accompanying their new *Consumer Behavior* textbook. Hershey has also had his software review, "Undergraduate Research Need Not Compromise on Software," accepted for publication in *The Marketing Educator*, the education newsletter of the American Marketing Association.

Paul E. Parker, assistant professor of political science, was one of 70 faculty from the humanities, social sciences and law invited to attend a conference sponsored by the American Bar Association titled "Litigation, Justice, and the Public Good" in San Diego, Apr. 25-27.

Craig Payne, Language and Literature graduate teaching assistant, won a \$1,000 prize in the 1990 Amy Awards Writing Competition for non-fiction essays. The Amy Awards competition is a nationwide writing contest designed to encourage the discussion of moral issues in secular media. The award is Payne's third.

Jod: Pelegrin, assistant athletic trainer, represented Northeast at a seminar to study means of drug testing and education, April 18-19 in Raleigh, N.C.

Barry Cole Poyner, assistant professor of communication, attended the Central States Communication Association Convention in Chicago where he presented a paper, "Edenic Origins of Rhetoric in Genesis." In addition, his article "Worshipful Listening" appeared in the March issue of the *Gospel Advocate* and was revised and reprinted in the April issue of the *Christian Bible Teacher*.

The NMSU Ad Club claimed fourth place honors in District 9 of the National Student Advertising Competition, April 12 in Topeka, Kan. Five members presented the project including Natalie Breitman, Debra Carson, Douglas Hauser, Don McCain and Dave Mullison. This is the second consecutive year NMSU has been honored in this competition. Additional team members working on the project included Michelle Arnold, John Chroma, Jennifer Combs, Raegan Whitaker and Steve Wilmes. This year's challenge was to position American Airlines as the premier U.S. based international carrier among business travelers. The project included a 50-page book and a 20-minute presentation.
