18 Seniors Lead 1990 Senior Class Project

The class of 1990 has begun work on the annual NMSU Alumni Association/Senior Class Project, a drive to encourage graduating seniors to become life members of the NMSU Alumni Association. A central committee, consisting of 18 seniors, is directing this year's campaign.

Initiated in 1987, the project promotes the advantages of Association membership and the 50 percent discount given to seniors on lifetime membership, if paid by Dec. 31 of the graduation year.

Lifetime membership for graduating seniors is \$50, or \$60 for a joint lifetime membership (husband and wife). A lifetime member never pays annual fees. Annual membership is \$10 or \$13 for joint members.

The benefits available to Association members include a subscription to *Nemoscope Notes* and a copy of the annual limited-edition NMSU poster/calendar, as well as discounts on Homecoming event tickets and merchandise sold through the Alumni Office and the Campus Bookstore catalog.
