Northeast's 125th: Bulldog Football

The first game of intercollegiate football was played on the Rutgers University campus on November 6, 1869, between Princeton and Rutgers Universities. At that time, there were 25 players on a side. Using a round ball, the game was played in six periods of fifteen minutes each. Although the game resembled soccer, some rules were quite different.

Thirty years after that first intercollegiate football game, in the fall of 1899, football was played for the first time at the Normal School with the approval of the administration. That fall, a few interested young men began learning the nature of the game by kicking and passing the pigskin ball to each other. Before the season closed, sides were chosen and football was inaugurated.

The following fall, the Normal School played its first official intercollegiate football game the afternoon of Friday,

November 2, 1900, with Oaklawn College, located at Novelty in Knox county. The score was 76-0 in favor of the Kirksville team, an auspicious beginning of a program that has existed for 92 years, except for the years of: 1912 and 1913, the World War I year of 1918, and the World War II years of 1942-1944. Since its beginning the team has won its conference championship 26 times.

In 1903, a faculty athletic committee was appointed by President Kirk to supervise and regulate athletic contests. Also in that year, a large athletic field was made in the northwest corner of the campus by clearing out the trees and leveling the ground. It was named by the students for the man who promoted the project, President John R. Kirk. The field gave much interest to the students, which helped build the popularity of football through the years.

The Kansas City Symphony, celebrating its 11th year during the 1992-93 season,

is one of the Midwest's artistic jewels. Music Director and Conductor William McGlaughlin is the driving artistic force behind the orchestra. Now in his seventh season with the Symphony, McGlaughlin has garnered accolades for the orchestra on the local and national levels. The Symphony has taped two nationally broadcast PBS television specials, released its first album on the Gramavision label and performed nationally on public radio.

The Symphony continues its active touring schedule this season to area educational institutions and large and small towns throughout the region.

On the program for Nov. 19 are Handel's Concerto Grosso in B-flat Major, Op. 3, No. 2; Mozart's Concerto No. 22 in E-flat Major for Piano and Orchestra, K. 482; and Nielsen's Symphony No. 4, Opus 29, "The Inextinguishable." The performance will feature pianist, Joseph Kalichstein.

Administrative Searches to Begin

The search is under way for three administrative positions on campus. President Russell Warren has appointed search committees for the positions of Administrative Services, Dean of Students, and Director of Human Resources.

The Dean of Administrative Services is a new position designed to coordinate the existing areas of business and financial affairs, human resources, physical plant, facilities planning and capital construction, and computer services.

"Each person in these areas does a fine job," Warren said, "But I believe each area would benefit from an individual who is able to take an overview of all the areas together to come up with broad, creative ideas."

Warren said this addition is especially important as the University faces issues such as addressing the cost of deferred maintenance on academic buildings and developing a new computerized financial system. Dale Schenewerk, executive assistant to the president, will chair the search committee.

Pulitzer Prize-winning poet Galway Kinnell will be reading selections of his poetry in the Ryle Hall main lounge on Nov. 9 at 7:30 p.m.

Kinnell, a native of Pawtucket, R.I., has taught at a wide variety of

colleges and universities throughout the United States, as well as abroad. He is currently a professor of arts and sciences at New York University.

Besides winning the Pulitzer Prize in 1983 for poetry, Kinnell has received many other awards and honorary degrees.

He is the author of several books of poetry, as well as prose, and has translated the works of the French poet, Francois Villon.

His presentation is free and open to the public.

Warren said the search committee for the Dean of Students will be chaired by Vonnie Nichols, who has served as acting dean of students since April 1991.

"Vonnies has done a superb job but all along has indicated that she did not wish to remain in the position on a permanent basis," Warren said.

"This has been an enjoyable learning experience for me," Nichols said, "but I have worked in student affairs at Northeast for 20 years and I think this is the right time for someone to bring a new perspective to our program to help it continue to progress."

Warren has appointed Russ Harrison, director of human resources, to chair the search committee for a new director. Harrison plans to retire at the end of the current fiscal year.
