INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT INTERN PROGRAM ... The Agency for International Development is accepting applications for its International Development Intern Program. There are two classes of interns each year in March and September; to be considered for the September, 1977 class, an applicant must submit his/her resume by November 26, 1976. Announcements of successful candidates will be made in April or May, 1977.

Eligible candidates include individuals who hold graduate degrees in agriculture, agricultural economics, social or applied anthropology, economics, civil engineering, education planning/administration, finance, business administration, nutrition or public health. Candidates with undergraduate degrees in accounting, plus at least one year of professional experience, are also eligible.
