## THIS WEEK...

**LATE REGISTRATION** and free add/drop will begin from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. today and continue through Friday. Late registrants can carry no more than 14 hours. They will be accepted into only those classes in which the instructor feels that the student can make up any work missed. The 14-hour maximum load limit can be waived with permission from the Dean of Instruction's Office.

**STUDENTS PAYING FEES** with bank loans, private scholarships, cash or check, should go to the Cashier's Window by 4 p.m. Friday.

**FINANCIAL AID RECIPIENTS**, with the exception of students receiving bank loans and scholarships, should go to the tables near the Business Office, 105 Administration/Humanities Building, by 4 p.m. Friday. Students must pay their first full tuition and fees installment at that time. If students are unable to meet this deadline for the first full installment, they need to go to the Business Office before Friday to request a deferment of fees. Financial aid recipients must personally visit the Business Office to sign the appropriate forms in order to have the aid applied toward tuition and fees. Students may sign for their aid according to the last digit of their Social Security number:

**STUDENTS WHO HAVE** prepaid their fees and housing in full for the first month may wait until the second week of classes to claim their aid. Students missing their scheduled time may come to the Business Office; however, aid not claimed by Sept. 6, will be cancelled.

**THE VALIDINE SYSTEM** is used for admittance to residence hall dining. Students who have not had their ID picture taken for the Validine card can have it taken today at the Food Service Office in the Student Union Building and during mealtimes Saturday and Sunday in their residence halls.

**THE PAINT SHOP** will be open from 2 to 4 p.m. Mondays through Fridays. The Paint Shop is located in the basement of Blanton Hall on the southeast side.

## NMSU model emulated

Northeast Missouri State University's Value-Added Model of Assessment is being emulated by colleges and universities nationwide. The winner of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' highest honor, the G. Theodore Mitau Award for Innovation and Change in Higher Education, Northeast's comprehensive testing, advising and surveying program ensures its students of receiving a top-quality, individualized education.

Several colleges and universities have asked Northeast to be a consul-

tant for incorporating facets of value-added at their institutions. During the past year, NMSU has been a consultant to Pittsburg State (Kansas), Independence (Kan.) Community College, the University of Arkansas-Little Rock, South Dakota State University (Brookings), the University of South Dakota (Vermillion), Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, St. John's College (Kansas) and the Independent Colleges in New Jersey.

Northeast has also made presentations on its value-added concept at AASCU's national meeting and at the regional meeting of the Involvement in Learning Report conducted by the National Institute of Education.

## Lyceum enters 25th season

Northeast's Lyceum Series kicks off its seven-performance lineup, Sept. 24, with remarks by the Hon. Jeane J. Kirkpatrick, former U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.

Two exciting performances are scheduled for October, including the Lyric Opera of Kansas City in "Faust," Oct. 14. One of America's leading operas, they will perform Gounod's "Faust" in English with orchestra.

In conjunction with Northeast's Homecoming weekend, noted actor, Vincent Price, comes to campus for two days performing and conducting workshops, Oct. 26.

The Meredith String Quartet of the Des Moines Symphony Orchestra rings in the new year, Jan. 13. The Meredith Corporation-sponsored ensemble is the Quartet-in-Residence at the Edmunds Academy of Fine Arts.

The Saint Louis Black Repertory Company brings "Ain't Misbehavin'" to the stage, Feb. 5, and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra makes its annual encore performance, Feb. 26.

The Tamburitians Folk Ensemble closes out the 1985-86 season, March 25. The company of 45 musicians, singers and dancers perform a program of east European folk selections.

The Lyceum idea began in 1899 and has led an on-and-off existence since then. Gilbert Kohlenberg, professor of history, established the Lyceum Committee in 1960 and still heads that organization.

All Lyceum Series performances begin at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Hall Auditorium. Students, faculty and staff may pick up tickets prior to each performance at no charge, at the Student Activities Board Office in the Student Union Building.
