THE ANNUAL FACULTY EXHIBITION opens tonight with a reception from 7-8:30 in the University Gallery. RODGERS AND HAMMERSTEIN'S "OKLAHOMA" will be presented Wednesday at 8 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium by The Young Americans. The students began participating Jan. 10 in the 12th annual Intercollegiate Business Game sponsored by Emory University. Their team, and teams from 29 other universities throughout the U.S., each will manage a computer-simulated manufacturing firm for six weeks, ending in an oral presentation before a panel of judges at Emory in early March.
