FRESHMAN TESTS will be administered on October 30, according to information released by the Dean of Instruction's Office. These tests are an extension of the senior test program implemented two years ago. Data collected through these tests will be used to measure student growth at Northeast.

The testing program is administered by Dr. Robert Wright, Director of Counseling and Testing. All full-time first-time freshmen students will be required to take the test, which will be given from 1:00 to 5:30 on Thursday, October 30, in Violette Hall and Science Hall. Thursday afternoon was chosen so as to cause as little disruption of classes as possible. However, some faculty members will be asked to move their classes to other buildings to provide rooms for testing.

All faculty members who have Thursday afternoon classes will receive a list of freshmen to be excused to take the test. A list of rooms to be used and directions for students will be included in the October 23 INDEX.

Faculty cooperation with this testing program is greatly appreciated. The freshman test will provide a basic standard for all entering students, and will allow better counseling and advising. It is expected that the test results will provide valuable information for both internal analysis of the student body and requests for funds from the General Assembly.

THE ST. LOUIS SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA will perform at 8 p.m. Wednesday in Baldwin Hall Auditorium. The concert is free to University faculty, staff and students. Tickets should be picked up in the Student Union from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. through Wednesday. Identification cards must be presented. The concert is also open to the public. General admission tickets at \$2 each may be purchased in the Business Office through Wednesday or at the box office beginning at 7 p.m. Wednesday. The performance is part of the Lyceum Series and is supported by a grant from the Missouri Council on the Arts.

ROBERT MEZEY, AMERICAN POET AND TRANSLATOR, will give a reading of his poetry at 4 p.m. today in the Alumni Room of the Student Union. The reading is being sponsored by the Language and Literature Division and the Missouri State Council on the Arts. It is open to the public free of charge.

18TH CENTURY FRENCH BAROQUE MUSIC will be performed by Robert Luke, viola da gamba, and Dale Everett, harpsichord, at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Kirk Memorial. Both performers are members of the University's music faculty. The concert is free and open to the public.

The program will consist mainly of works by Marin Marais (1656-1728). Last year Luke received a faculty research grant which enabled him to research and study rare manuscripts by Marais.

BICENTENNIAL DISPLAYS IN THE LIBRARY today through the end of the month include the library's collection of Bicentennial Flags and Posters shown in the window entrance and on the peg board near the Serials Office on the first floor. Also, Jack Hines, Social Science, will have a display of political cartoons in the cases in the lobby. The Military Science Division is sponsoring an exhibit of U.S. Army history for the past 200 years located in the browsing area on the first floor. The display came to the University on a loan basis from Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.

Displays in the cases on the second floor include "Books that Changed America" and "Founding Fathers: Lives and Works" which has books and facsimiles of historical documents.

Odessa Ofstad is displaying some multi-media materials from the Music Library on the third floor near the Curriculum Library. The display is entitled "See and Hear Our Heritage."
