## Lyceum Presents Summit Brass



America's first and only large brass ensemble, the Summit Brass, will present a performance at 8 p.m., Feb. 11, in Baldwin Auditorium. The concert, a Lyceum Series presentation, is funded in part by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The group will also conduct master classes for NMSU brass students at 9:30 a.m., Feb. 12, in Baldwin Hall. Instructing the classes will be John Daley, principal, Boston Symphony Orchestra (trombone); Daniel Perantoni, soloist and recording artist (tuba); Raymond Mase, American Brass Quintet and New York recording artist (trumpet); and William Klingelhoffer, co-principal, San Francisco Opera Orchestra (horn). Anyone interested is welcome to sit in on a class.

Part of the ensemble's popularity lies in the wide range of music it

performs. Their varied program will include Fanfare from "La Peri" by Dukas, Copland's "Fanfare for the Common Man," and "Tocatta and Fugue" by Bach. Also included will be portions of Bernstein's "Mass" and another American composer, Haufrecht's "Symphony for Brass and Timpani." Trumpet soloist Anthony Plog will present his "Music for Brass Octet," and three canzoni by Gabrieli have been specially arranged by trumpet player Raymond Mase.

The members of Summit Brass include some of the finest brass players in the world and come from such renowned groups as the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Boston Symphony, the Denver Symphony, the Saint Louis Symphony, the Dallas Symphony and the San Francisco Opera. The Summit Brass is conducted by Carl Topilow, who

also conducts the National Repertory Orchestra.

The issuing of a second recording with ProArte Recording Co. and a live performance on the national public radio show, "Saint Paul Sunday Morning," highlighted the group's 1987-88 season. Their first recording, "Episodes," which featured "Doc" Severinsen as a soloist, has been released on cassette and compact disc. Summit Brass also annually hosts the Keystone Brass Institute in Keystone, Colo., for young professionals and talented college students.

Free tickets for the ensemble's performance will be available for students, faculty and staff at the SAB Office, SUB and at the door.

Recording, videotaping and photographing the performance without written consent of the producer/manager is prohibited.

To be eligible, applicants must meet the following requirements: Missouri resident, high school senior or freshman or sophomore at a four-year college or university in Missouri, rank in the top 15 percent of high school class or score in the top 15 percent on the SAT, ACT or SCAT exams, and enter a teacher education program at a four-year college or university in Missouri.
