The residential colleges of the University will present two seminars by Al Siebert, an adjunct professor with the schools of business, education, and continuing education at Portland State University, on Thursday and Friday.

Siebert's first seminar, titled "The Human Being of the Future: The Survivor Personality," will be held from 1:30-3 p.m. Thursday in the SUB Tangerine Room. The seminar is open to all students. On Friday, from 9-11 a.m., Siebert will hold a book signing session in the Campus Bookstore featuring his book *Student Success*. His final seminar, "Effective Teaching Skills" will take place from 1:30-4 p.m. in the SUB Alumni Room. This seminar is open

to faculty members.

Siebert is a self-employed psychology professor. He creates and conducts practical psychology classes and workshops for professional groups, businesses, government agencies, and education and healthcare groups. He is also a popular speaker at conventions and conferences.

Siebert obtained his doctorate in psychology from the University of Michigan in 1965. He has conducted numerous workshops and authored several books. He is a member of the American Psychological Association, the Western Psychological Association and the National Orientation Directors Association.
